Meetings Give Farmers Chance For Discussion

FEDERATION MEETINGS
When this letter appears the annual meeting of the Queens County Federation will have been held. The O'Leary meeting will be taking place as of tonight (Thursday the twenty-fourth); the series will conclude in Souris at the United Church Center on Wednesday, November 30.

Special efforts are underway to make these meetings as interesting as possible. There will be no long speeches and those present will have the opportunity of raising problems and questions in small groups. Refreshments will be served and the illustrated talk given by Keith Kennedy on his recent visit to Russia should certainly be a highlight.

HARDSHIP REMOVAL

Farm and rural people are no strangers to hardships of a wide variety. Having to deal with the elements involves exposure to rain, snow, frost, mud and a variety of discomforts. As society and the economy becomes more completely urbanized it becomes more and more important to insulate the human animal from physical discomfort. Office buildings are over heated to keep scantily clad women comfortable to the discomfort of the more heavily dressed men folk. Every inch of ground is covered with asphalt that no bit of earth may intrude its unwelcome presence.

One of the great developments of recent times has been the speed and comfort of air travel but here as in all other modern developments there has been a flaw and one in particular was the fact that air passengers are required to proceed on foot from the terminal building to the plane. In some cases this involved a walk up to 100 feet in bright sunlight, under starry skies or exposed to rain and fog, snow, even snow or frost. Now a major breakthrough has been made by one air line which ramps to the side of the ship thus protecting the cash customer from many and all weather conditions. Truly the pioneer era is over.

LIVESTOCK MARKETING

We have recently handed, on a confidential basis, a report on livestock marketing in this province. Eventually the report in question will become available to the public and we suspect it will be read with very considerable interest.

The report in question exhibits a very good understanding of the advantages and disadvantages of the system or lack of system under which cattle and hogs are marketed in this province. However, there are straws in the wind which seem to indicate some changes for the better and certainly the most important one is the cattle auction held weekly on Tuesday afternoons at the Exhibition Grounds. This sale is being very well patronized indeed and is serving not only to move large numbers of cattle but also in making available authentic quotations on cattle of different quality.

FLUID MILK MEETING

The P. E. I. Fluid Milk Association is planning its annual meeting for early in December with the seventh as a tentative date. The fluid milk people during the past year obtained an increase in prices roughly in relation to the increase taking place in manufactured milk. However, prices in the dairy industry are far from static and it is probable that next spring manufacturing milk will again move upwards leaving the fluid sector again out of balance.

While generally food prices in this province tend to be as high or even higher than in other parts of the country, this situation is not the case with respect to fluid milk, here Island consumers enjoy a good quality product at possibly the lowest prices.

WEATHER VAGARIS

Last week when the squaw winter arrived there were some interesting contrasts. Charlottetown received no snow until Thursday morning but during the previous Tuesday and Wednesday the Montague area had accumulated over six inches. The local press striving manfully to keep the public informed reported three inches of snow for Pictou. Can we be excused for being puzzled on the score of three inches being newsworthy in Pictou but double that amount being disregarded in the Eastern part of the province. While the snow had some unpleasant aspects its complete disappearance was welcome and certainly made an important contribution to improving the ground water problem. While at times of writing the snow is stopped prospects are for mild weather giving the opportunity of tidying up some late late cultivation.

MARITIME INCOME

The statistics people confirm what most of us have suspected for sometime that we can live with considerably less money in the Maritimes than is the case in certain other parts of Canada. On the face of it this would appear to be an advantage provided, of course, that the living is on a comparable basis with the statistically more affluent parts of the country.

The important question here, of course, is why do people earn less money in the Maritimes than Ontario and Quebec? An uncharitable answer might suggest that we are lazy, that we are inefficient, that we are afraid of risking worthwhile capital in what we are doing. However, such a dogmatic answer would hardly suffice as it must be realized that much of Maritime industry is of the primary variety, that we are lacking in really large population centres and that many if not most of the higher paying industries, are

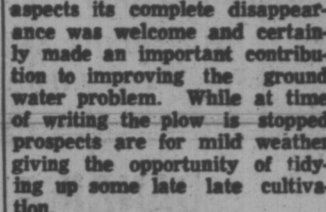
SOIL AND CROPS

New Award Announced

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (CP) — Premier Bennett has announced recently the creation of a new award of merit by the province of British Columbia — The Order of the Dogwood.

The premier made the announcement, and named the first five recipients, at a banquet in nearby Langley marking British Columbia's 100th birthday.

The award was authorized by an order-in-council approved earlier Saturday at a special cabinet meeting held in historic Fort Langley, on the Fraser River about 20 miles upstream from Vancouver.

Premier Bennett said The Order of the Dogwood is to be an honor to citizens who have made a special contribution of worth to the development of the province. It may not be awarded to members of government while in office.

Named to the order by the Premier Saturday night were Queen Mother Elizabeth; the lord mayor of London, Sir Robert Bellinger; Frank Ross, B.C.'s lieutenant-governor from 1955 to 1960; Clarence Wallace, Mr. Ross's predecessor; and Viscount Amory, governor of the Hudson's Bay Co. who officiated in February at the opening of centennial celebrations in B.C.

A highlight of Saturday's festivities was the docking here of the paddle-wheeler Beaver, a navy-built replica of the first steam-powered vessel to ply the waters of the B.C. coast.
