

# Garden Of The Gulf Museum Opens Its Doors In Montague

The Garden of the Gulf Museum Montague, is now open to the public with the official opening to take place at a later date. In co-operation with the Provincial Tourist Bureau, a tourist centre is being operated in conjunction with the museum. Mrs. Doris Lewellyn is the efficient receptionist, and will be assisted by members of the Montague Junior Board of Trade. Museum hours are: daily, 9:30 to 11:30 and 1:30 to 5:30; Sunday, 1:30 to 5:30. On Sunday last, over 200 people visited the Museum many of them were out of province visitors. Although many items in the collection have come from donors in Kings County, others have been received from as far as North Cape and East Point. Among the many interesting items are guns and pistols, old coins and paper money including old Prince Edward Island Monies, spinning and weaving tools, marine and mining items, bird mountings, carpentry tools, farm implements and clocks, jewellery, a mastodon tooth, a model of the ice boat used to cross the Northumberland Straits. These and many other interesting articles make up over 500 exhibits in all. Landscaping of the museum grounds will begin shortly, to add to the attractiveness of the setting.

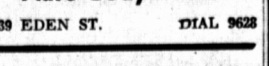
