**Cover Illustration:**

The winter of 2000-01 was a great winter for American Robins due to a healthy abundance of berries. These robins from more northern regions appear to stop here when they encounter large crops of berries. This past winter there was an abundance of mountain ash, wild rose, apple, and crab apple. Overwintering robins can be fed fruit such as apples (particularly crab apples) and berries (blueberries, wild cherries, cranberries, raisins, and other small fruits).
