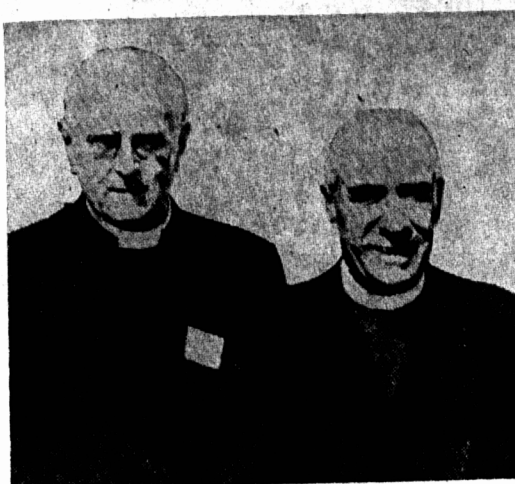

Christian Faith Issue Raised In United Church Publication; Cardinal McGuigan Makes Reply

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP) — The United Church of Canada Wednesday said Catholicism "runs counter to Christian Truth" and its priesthood "often hinders man's quest of God."
The church released for public sale a 64-page booklet purporting to define the difference between Protestant and Roman Catholic beliefs. Its release coincided with the opening here of the 16th general council conference of the United Church.
The work took four years and represents the first major attempt by Canada's major Protestant faith to rebut teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. It underlines, however, that the two denominations had some things in common.
The book said: "Whatever our differences, we must remember that we have grown from the same root." Roman Catholics view Protestants as "heretics" instead of "heathens" and this was "significant."
But it said "Protestants believe that Roman Catholics possess a corrupted form of Christianity" although "we ought gratefully to acknowledge the piety, devotion and good works of our Roman Catholic brethren insofar as they are true to the Gospel."
The author was Dr. Arthur G. Reynolds, minister of St. Paul's United Church at Elmville, Ont., who produced it under direction of the commission on the Christian faith of the United Church.
"We are face to face with a threat to Christianity in all its forms."
"If (the booklet) involved an attack on the Catholic Church, we sincerely believe that all unnecessary controversy and especially attack of one religion against another is outdated, ill-timed, futile and even harmful."
