Over 125 young people from various centres on the Island were in attendance at this most successful conference.

Aims Of University Women's Federation Outlined Here

In addressing the monthly meeting of the University Women's Club of Charlottetown, the guest speaker, Miss Una Wilson, emphasized the ways by which CFUW endeavors to carry out its purposes, and the importance of CFUW committees in carrying out this work.

Miss Wilson is the Canadian Federation of University Women vice-president for the east.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. J. E. Burnett and was presided over by the president, Miss Helen Yeo. The guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. L. Lothian.

Miss Wilson's speech was considered to be of great value in achieving a closer link between the local club and Canadian Federation of University Women.

The first purpose of CFUW is to develop high standards of education in Canada, and to encourage advanced study and research for women. The committee on education carries out this purpose, while the fellowship committee awards five fellowships yearly, having a total value of \$8,500.00.

A second purpose of CFUW is to arouse amongst members an interest in public affairs in political, social and cultural fields and encourage an active participation of qualified women in such affairs. The Libraries and creative arts committee is one committee working in the cultural field.

The third aim is to guard and improve the economic, legal and professional status of Canadian Women. One committee fulfilling this purpose is the status of women committee. Specific effort was made in regard to the Es-

late Tax Bill, and a brief was presented to the government.

The fourth aim is to facilitate understanding and cooperation among university women nationally and internationally, irrespective of race, religion or political opinions.

The international relations committee strive to achieve this purpose. One method is through assistance to refugees.

Miss Wilson also emphasized the responsibility of the university graduate to other women, and that she should give leadership in educational, political and cultural fields.

Mrs. W.G. Hogg, Jr., thanked Miss Wilson on behalf of the club members. Following the meeting the group had an opportunity to talk to Miss Wilson while coffee was served.
