Household Hints.

Hiccough may be cured in a minute by one drop of Gelsemium (yellow gessamine) administered in water. This is a serious trouble with some people, but the remedy will not fail.

For Coughs and Colds.—A preparation made according to the following recipe is a positive cure for coughs and colds:—

Simmer one pound of honey in the comb and the juice of six lemons together. Skim, and when nearly cold add one gill of juniper berry gin.

Cure for Diphtheria.—Take a piece of camphor gum the size of a pea, lay it on the tongue, as it dissolves, swallow. If taken in season, is a sure cure.

For a Felon.—When they first commence, bathe the part affected with turpentine.

Cure for Vomiting.—Swallow small pieces of ice. Hold the ice in the mouth until the edges get smooth.

For Cankerred Sore Throat.—Honey and vinegar tinctured with cayenne. Just moisten the throat.

For Catarrh.—Pulverized blood-root and gum camphor. Care should be used to take in very small particles.

For Chapped Hands, and to keep them delicate.—Vinegar and milk—two-thirds milk. Also, to remove stains from the hands, lemon juice. To bathe hands, lemon juice and milk.

To Prevent Wounds from Mortifying.—Sprinkle sugar upon them.

To Cleanse a Bad Sore.—Wash in a decoction of walnut leaves sweetened with sugar.

To Take Castor Oil.—Boil with equal quantity of milk, sweeten well, stir together and cool. Children like it.

For Mending Jet Articles.—Shellac is the best cement. Smoking the joint renders it black to match.

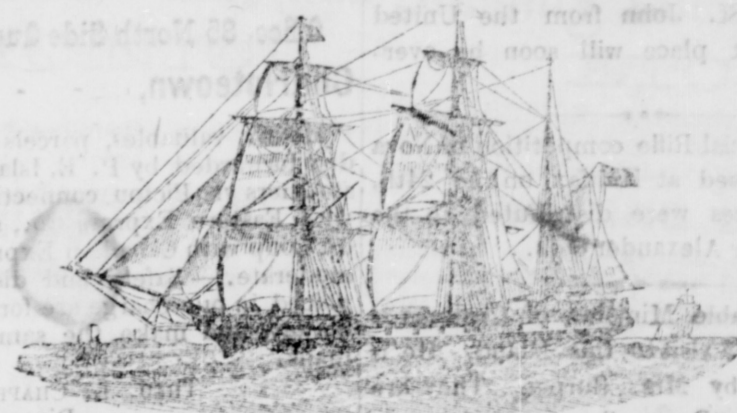
