Eggs sold at from 21 to 22 cents per dozen. Geese were on sale in extra supply with good demand at 60 to 80 cents each. Ducks brought from 50 to 70 cents per pair. Turkeys sold well at from 70 cents to \$1.30 each. Cheese of good quality brought from 14 to 16 cents per lb.

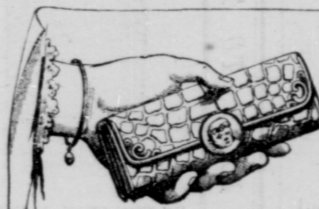
