



## Casualties Identified

**SUMMERSIDE** — Two air men from RCAF Station, Summerside were found dead in a car yesterday morning buried in deep snow on the road near St. Eleanor's. It is believed they died from asphyxiation.

Leading Aircraftman William Arthur Adams, 21, of Springfield, N.S., and Leading Aircraftman James Reginald Hall, 19, of Hamilton, Ont., were found at approximately 8:45 a.m. yesterday in a 1956 model car which was completely buried in snow. Both men were fire fighters at the RCAF Station.

Two other air force men, who had been travelling in the car with the victims the preceding night, left the vehicle after it became stuck and sought shelter in the nearby residential district on West Drive. They were reported safe and well last night.

The car was apparently travelling towards Summerside when it became lodged in the snow. The vehicle was about 300 yards west of St. Eleanor's Corner on Highway 2.

Weather during the night and all day yesterday was extremely bad in the area with several inches of snow having fallen and winds in excess of 50 miles per hour causing a heavy ground drift.

"I must be the unhappiest man in Britain," said bicyclist Charlie Cooper. "I don't want all this money. I was happy as I was with my mum in Bethnal Green. A poor student of London."

The 26-year-old clerk had just come out of a bank where he held a two-hour conference with investment experts. "I feel depressed and really unhappy. But I should be the happiest man in Britain. I'm worth a quarter of a million and today the doctors gave me a final check-up on the hernia operation I had six weeks ago. And they passed me."

## Children Cranded In School At Crapaud

A hundred school children, cranded in their school buildings at Crapaud, were stranded for hours on the Trans-Canada Highway between Albert and Charlottetown, as one of the winter's worst storms swept the province last night.

England's High remained open during the day as the school was in the midst of Easter exams. Approximately 30 students, residents of the village of Crapaud and Victoria, were driven to their home by teachers at the school.

Post dispatcher Brian Scott reported last night that motorists were stranded on the main highway and plows were doing their best to get the motorists to safety.

Later yesterday afternoon the Department of Highways dispatched a plow with an RCMP escort to a road block on the Souris Highway where a small child lay ill. Late last night the child was reported to be in "satisfactory condition."

A youth about 12 years of age, Jarvis Yoo, was reported missing from the home where he was staying on Kensington Road, Parisville at approximately 4:30 p.m. He was believed to be heading for Summerside, but Police here stated that the lad most likely was staying in an all-night service station or restaurant and will be located here.

Berford woman was rushed to St. Ambrose following a Highway Dept. plow in the Charlottetown Hospital where she had a pediatric operation.

Near midnight the Borden River was being held by Hunter River while snow fitting crews were attempting to force a freight train stuck at North Willshire, a few miles to the East. The carriers had no difficulty clearing the train.

The Charlottetown Radio Range reported that some nine feet of snow had fallen in this area since the storm, being driven by winds that piled drifts high and heavy.

Les Grandes Lacs Canadiens, scheduled last night for Queen Charlotte High was cancelled after the troupe's bus became stuck outside Borden. They returned to the mainland after being led back to Borden by three highway plows.

Condition in Kings and west Prince were just as bad as the rest of P.E.I. with plows operating on roads.

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## Police State Powers Are Killed in Ontario

TORONTO (CP) — Premier Roberts decreed sudden death Friday for a 40-page "police powers" amendment to the Government's Police Amendment Act.

The province told the legislature, and then reiterated out of the House, that provisions of the bill which had been widely condemned as oppressive would not go through the legislature.

Mr. Roberts overruled a member of his cabinet, Attorney General Cass, who had argued that the bill would curtail the powers of the Ontario Police Commission.

The bill introduced in the legislature by the attorney-general, Mr. Cass, would have given the Ontario Police Commission the power to imprison persons indefinitely without trial.
