NOW STAMP WIDOW TAKES HER PLACE

TORONTO, May 2—(C.P.)—Among philatelic contributions of the annual exhibition of the Toronto Collectors' Club was the president's admission there is such a person as a "stamp widow." He thus originated a phrase that may yet take its place with the more generally known "golf widow," denoting a wife whose husband forsakes her for his favorite pursuit.

Although stamp-collecting is a hobby pre-eminently masculine, one of the most interesting collections shown was the property of a little girl. By means of these bits of paper the history of the United States was vividly portrayed. Beginning with Viking stamps from Iceland and Columbus stamps from Columbus the array displayed the story of the republic right up to the discovery of Little America.

Oddy enough, a flaw in a stamp sometimes enhances its value. When Canada last year produced Princess Elizabeth's portrait on stamps to celebrate the King's Jubilee, the 21st stamp of each print from the first plate showed a tiny "sardor" on the face of the princess. Now the flawed stamp, dubbed the "Weeping Princess" is much valued. Since a flaw thus makes a stamp more valuable, many forged flaws are in circulation. Some collectors gather these forgeries as a sort of side-line curiosity.

LONDON, May 3—(C. P.)—Though the Oxford crew lost the boat race against Cambridge, they won the heart of every child patient in St. George's Hospital. They spent nearly two hours in the children's ward in response to an invitation sent out to them by seven-year-old Eric Hunt, who was in hospital having his tonsils out. When seven members of the crew, their cox, and their coach walked into the children's ward for tea the first thing they saw was a sketch, done on the blackboard by one of the little girls, of a man looking rather down in the mouth and with the title, "The Oxford Boat Race" chalked underneath. They soon broke down any feeling of shyness, romping and playing games with the children.

TALK SHORT CROP OF FRENCH WHEAT

PARIS, May 2—(C.P.)—France, which normally produces just enough wheat to supply bread for her 40,000,000 citizens, may have to import part of her needs for both the wheat carry-over and crop forecasts are low. The mild and extremely wet winter, unfavorable for winter wheat, which comprises the greater part of the country's crop, is expected by agricultural forecasters to reduce the total yield even below last year's low output of 76,000,000 quintals (about 278,000,000 bushels). A 75,000,000-quintal crop is probable. Wheat prices, no longer directly regulated by law, have been rising rapidly in anticipation of the shortage. The price jumped from 70 francs a bushel last August to 104 francs a quintal—the equivalent of \$1.68 a bushel—in March.
