## 6-Classroom Addition Opened At St. Eleanor's

SUMMERSIDE — The modern six-classroom addition to St. Eleanor's School was opened yesterday thus eliminating the use of the Lions Club and the Community Hall which have been utilized since September while the addition was being constructed.

With the three former classrooms the school now has nine rooms and an enrollment of approximately 300. One of the new classrooms was converted into washrooms. Of the nine rooms, only eight are being used at present, one being left as a standby in case of increased enrollment. Provision was also made for an assembly room which can be converted into two classrooms if necessary.

The new school has been the object of many congratulatory remarks and is a fine addition to the progressive village.

The work was supervised by R. B. Rankin and is of steel and concrete construction.

The principal is Mrs. Joyce Rogers who heads up the department containing seven other teachers.

The chairman of the school board is Norman Johnson.

## Power Increase On Island Noted

OTTAWA — Prime Edward Edwards' thermal electric capacity was increased by 2,200 KW in 1962, according to an annual year-end review of the development of electric power in Canada. The report, presented by the water resources branch of the department of northern affairs and national resources, notes that P.E.I. depends almost exclusively on thermal electric generation to satisfy its power needs.

The report notes that the capacity of the Summerside thermal plant was increased by the installation of a 2,200 KW unit. Total generating capacity of the plant is now 7,281 KW in nine units. A total of 15 m. l.t.s. of distribution line was added to the town's system in 1962.

The Maritime Electric Company reports completion of 35 miles of distribution line in 1962. Some 400 new farm customers were provided with service during the year, bringing the number of farms supplied by 118 e. lines to 15,530. Northern Affairs Minister Walter Dinsdale notes that in 1962 Canada's total electric power producing capacity was increased by the installation of 415,468 horsepower of hydro-electric power, a 4.1 per cent increase over 1961.

## Red Cross Loans Sickroom Supplies In Alberton Area

ALBERTON — Alberton Red Cross loan cupboard made 50 loans of sickroom supplies during the year just concluded.

This service of the Red Cross was first made available in Alberton through request of the local Women's Institute in 1948. At the beginning it was in custody of the Sisters of St. Martha at the Western Hospital. In 1953 Mrs. A. C. Green became custodian and she still holds that position.

As it became known that this service was available the public has made increasing use of it from year to year. In 1949 only eight loans were made. In 1952 there were 21. Since then the number has varied from 31 to 80 loans annually, the peak year being 1957.

Since 1949 a total of 618 loans have been made and in almost every case people are most appreciative of this free service. Some have given tangible expression to their appreciation, thus enabling the Red Cross to purchase additional equipment.

There have been some cases of negligence in renewing loans at the end of the one month period for which they are made and in three cases there has been real difficulty in securing return of articles loaned. Fortunately, these situations are rare.

Within the past month a hospital bed has been placed in this loan cupboard through the Overseas Service Club whose generosity is greatly appreciated. The Red Cross is a member organization in the P.E.I. United Fund.

needed that reporters change the subject from nuclear weapons. When they didn't, he finally declined to reply to more questions and the nuclear charges and they could not back them up in court.
