In the show. He commended the staff of his department for their efforts in arranging the competitions and thanked the Provincial Exhibition Association for the use of the grounds. Dr. J. P. Lantz welcomed all to the competitions.
Holsteins, as usual in Provincial shows, led the breeds in the number of animals shown with 51 heifers and steers being led into the ring. Ayrshires were second with 25 head, Jerseys third with 15, Shorthorns fourth with twelve and Herefords fifth with nine.
Judges of the Holsteins were Mr. H. J. Kennedy and R. A. Profit, Freetown. Both men thought the we were many fine animals exhibited and following the showing of the Holstein yearling classes, Mr. Profit commented that the animals of the Milcovie Club were outstanding as far as depth and size were concerned.
The three top calves and the three best yearlings were selected from each club and entered in the competitions. The animals were judged in groups of three with individual selections being made for the champion and reserve.
The Farmington-Mount Hope group took top honors in the competitions in the Ayrshire calf classes. The three animals shown were owned by Elmer Curran, Vernon and Alban Wood.
But the champion Ayrshire calf came from the Freetown Club and was owned by Ronnie Lewis. Mr. Curran's champion was owned by Vernon Wood.
Freetown placed second in the calf classes with Gowen Brae coming third and the St. Phillippe Club fourth. The latter club, entries did not arrive until after the show had commenced due to motor difficulties on the road.
Favorable Comments
Mr. Fred MacRae, one of the most highly rated Ayrshire men in the breed, judged the entries and commented favorably upon the quality of animals shown. Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Station was pleased with the calves. Mr. Partridge presented prizes to the owners of the champion and reserve calves on behalf of the P. E. I. Ayrshire Breeders Association.
The St. Peter's Club entered the best group in the Ayrshire yearling classes. The winning animals were shown by Joseph Thompson, Jackie Lewis and Bobby Lewis. The Farmington-Mount Hope Club making great all around showings placed second, with another King's County entry, St. George's in third spot.
The Sanderson Herefords of North River, were back in their familiar top spot yesterday with Judge Mr. John DuPasquier of St. Peter's Bay placing the whitefaces.
The North River group of steers beat out the North River heifers for the top honors. The winning animals were shown by Vernon, Marjorie and Ralph Sanderson. A new club, Sea View placed third with their three steers.
Johnny Sanderson's Lady Paladome 2nd, winner of the Junior female championship and the grand reserve championship at the Provincial Exhibition, was judged champion of the Hereford calves shown yesterday. Reserve champion was an unregistered steer owned by Marjorie Sanderson.
A prize awarded by the P. E. I. Hereford Breeders Association was presented to Johnny Sanderson by Mr. Neil Mathieson and a prize awarded by the Provincial Department of Agriculture was presented to Marjorie Sanderson by Mr. Morris Deacon.
Shorthorn Honours
Shorthorn honors in the calf classes went to the Augustine Cove Club with fine showings by animals owned by George Murphy, Clair Carruthers and Norman Carruthers.

Rash Of Forest Fires Breaks Out In Alberta

EDMONTON, Sept. 22 - (CP) - Its forest and bush lands under-dry after an almost unprecedented warm spell, Northern Alberta tonight was in the throes of the worst fall fire battle in at least 10 years.
Fires were being fought in at least 31 districts.
The Government has 145 men and 16 bulldozers operating at fire fronts and these are swelled by hundreds of settlers.
Settlement fires were burning at Wainham, Newbrook and Fish Lake. Most of the other blazes were in unsettled and almost inaccessible regions.
At Wainham, 340 miles northwest of here, a fire seven miles long by four miles wide was reported to have destroyed two farms, with homes, buildings, livestock and machinery. Three towns are in the path of the fire.
Farmers work round-the-clock on fire fighting and harvesting their threatened grain crops.
At Newbrook, 60 miles north of Edmonton, 200 residents manned fire guards against a muskeg blaze which has approached within yards of the village from three sides.
Wind is the biggest factor in the fight at both Wainham and Newbrook. A wind shift today gave Newbrook its first smoke-free day in almost a week.
At Fishing Lake, 165 miles northwest of here, the homes of 60 Metis families are in the path of a fire crackling through scrub timber. The Metis are away, helping to harvest crops of others.
The Red Cross in Edmonton has dispatched relief supplies to Wainham and Newbrook.
Two of the forest fires in unsettled areas are considered serious. One burning west of Lac la Biche and another is raging in the Isogen Lake district northwest of Whitecourt. The latter area is without trails and some fire fighting equipment is being rafted up a river.
At Mercoo, 190 miles southwest of Edmonton, a coal mine fire 700 feet underground is being brought under control. The mine employs 350 men.

Those present were: Mr. Lorin Baker, Ottawa, director of Inspection and Production Services; Mr. E. D. Fraser, Halifax, chief supervisor for Maritime Fisheries; Mr. Ross Homans, Halifax, chief of inspectors; Consumers Service for the Maritimes; Mr. Spencer Homans, Halifax, inspector of pickled fish; Mr. J. J. Larabee, Charlottetown, supervisor fisheries was also present.
Mr. Baker in his remarks urged that the inspectors strive for the utmost cooperation from the industry.-S.

Wings Parade Held At Summerside Yesterday

The R.C.A.F.'s sixth class of post-war navigators were graduated from the Air Navigation School, Summerside, yesterday afternoon. Wings were presented by Group Captain H.G. Richards, O.B.E., commanding officer of the station. Seven of the graduates have the distinction of being the first post-war trained radio navigators. They received their radio officers' wings and commissions from the Radar and Communications School at Clinton, Ontario prior to their navigation course at Summerside.
Among those present at the ceremony were Brigadier W.W. Reid and Mrs. Reid of Charlottetown. Following the wings presentation a cocktail party was held in the officers mess.
In addition to the regular fly-past of Dakotas from the Summerside station nine Vampire jets from the Chatham base zoomed low over the parade and then "shot up" the runway individually.
After the wings were presented Group Captain Richards congratulated the graduates. He wished them the best of luck in all their future endeavors and pointed out that in receiving their wings they are only beginning their careers.
Their is a vast amount of work to be done in the R.C.A.F. He told the graduates, particularly in the field of navigation. The introduction of high speed jet aircraft is creating new problems which are hard and onerous but extremely interesting.
He extended his compliments to Wing Commander D.A. Willis, D.F.C., officer commanding the Air Navigation School and the instructors for their hard work.
