OPINIONS OF THE PRESS.

The latest statement of Sir Louis Davies to the effect that reciprocity negotiations will soon be re-opened has attracted a good deal of attention throughout Canada.

"Canadian opinion is not, so far as can be judged, by any means so anxious for reciprocity with the United States as it seems to have been in the past."

The Mail and Empire points out that a preference in respect to United States goods would, as in respect to those of other foreign countries, be incompatible with the pretended preference to British goods, and says—
