THE STATE FUNERAL.

OWING to delays of the Halifax mail, we are compelled to curtail considerably—omitting many interesting details—our correspondence respecting the state funeral of Sir John S. D. Thompson.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—Regular meeting this evening at 7.30.

LEGISLATIVE.—The New Brunswick Legislature has been summoned to meet at Fredericton on Thursday, January 11th.

CURLING.—Curling at the rink this afternoon. The club meet for play every Monday and Thursday afternoon and Friday evening.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.—The officers of the Y. M. C. A. will be elected this evening at 9 o'clock. The meeting will open at half-past eight.

The Grand Division, S. of T. of P. E. I., will hold its next quarterly session at Sevilleton on Wednesday, 30th inst., commencing at 11.30 a. m.

HOCKEY.—A meeting of the Victoria Hockey Club will be held in the Y. M. C. A. at 7.30 this evening for the election of captain and new members.

MASQUE.—The brethren of Victoria Lodge, No. 2, A. F. & M. M., will please remember the regular meeting this evening. Strangers welcome.

BURNS' ANNIVERSARY.—The Caledonian Club will hold a conversation in McEachern's Building on the anniversary of Burns' birthday—25th January.

A TIMELY SUGGESTION.—It is suggested that a subscription be taken up to defray the expense incidental to putting the town clock in working order again. The clock has been in a lullay ever since New Year's Day.

THE STANLEY LEFT GORE.—This morning, but up to three o'clock no further information respecting her movements was in possession of THE EXAMINER. As it is very foggy this afternoon she may not leave Pictou till it clears up somewhat.

THE RINK.—Band at the rink tonight. From 10 until 10.10 fast skating will be allowed to give scope for the coming races about the 25th inst. But in no case will fast kating be allowed before 10 p. m.

CARNIVAL.—A grand Carnival will be held in the Hillsborough Rink about the 14th February. The managers have decided to make it a grand success and volunteers, firemen, snow-shoers, clowns and nigger costumes will not be allowed to be represented.

BASKET SOCIAL.—A basket social in aid of the poor will be held in the Lyceum on Wednesday evening next, beginning at half-past seven and interesting and attractive programme has been prepared for the occasion, and a pleasant evening is assured all who attend.

C. M. B. A.—The officers of St. Dunstan's Branch, No. 216 of the C. M. B. A. were duly installed by the Rev. A. E. Burke, D. D., during his stay in the city. After the ceremony the Branch addressed the Rev. District Bishop in the usual form, to which he made a very appropriate reply.

HOME AGAIN.—The Island contingent to the funeral at Halifax returned home on Saturday, the last making no trip on Friday on account of the storm. The Superintendent's car was put at the disposal of the Governor, who had with him Bishop Macdonald and Father Burke, the Chief Justice, J. McLean, M. P., and other representative persons.

SUPREME COURT.—The Hilary Term of the Supreme Court will open to-morrow forenoon at eleven o'clock. The criminal docket consists of five cases, as follows: J. mes McNeill, manslaughter; Russel G. J. mes, larceny of a horse; Wallace Rice, neglecting to support his family; William Macdonald, attempting to obtain money by false pretences; William B. Hooper, perjury and forgery. Juries have been demanded in six new cases and three remanded.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, a young lad named William Mahar was sentenced to two months' imprisonment with hard labor, for beating his mother, who lives on Fitzroy Street. Jerome Flewitt, charged with assaulting his wife, will come up for trial to-morrow. William Macdonald, charged with attempting to obtain money by false pretences, was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court. The Scott Act case against P. S. Brown was further adjourned till the 14th January.

FIRE INVESTIGATION.—The investigation into the origin of the recent disasters at Mount Stewart, which began before H. J. Palmer, S. M., on Wednesday, was adjourned on Saturday until this forenoon, and Magistrate Palmer and lawyers Johnson and Good, spent Sunday in the city. Great interest taken in the evidence, the courtroom being packed from morning till night. Up to Saturday about twenty-five witnesses were examined, and the testimony of about fifteen others is yet to be taken.

THE EPIPHANY AT ST. DUNSTAN'S.—Yesterday was the Feast of the Epiphany, or Three Kings. At the Cathedral the Lordship Bishop Macdonald assisted at his throne in cope and mitre at the solemn High Mass celebrated by the Rev. Father Burke, assisted by the Rev. Father McDonald and Hogan, as deacon and sub-deacon. The Rev. Fathers Morrison and Reid were chaplains to the Bishop. The sermon was preached by Father Reid, and is highly spoken of. Mr. Blanchard's programme of music was fully up to the standard of that at the Midnight Mass. A splendid orchestra was added to the usual choir. In the evening political speakers were sung by Bishop McDonald, Father Burke acting as Arch-priest, and Fathers Reid and Hogan as Deacons. Benedictine followed, the choir giving that beautiful musical conception, "Pastors," among its numbers. The altar was one profusion of flowers and was ablaze with burning lights and tapers. The decorations were by the Grey Nuns.
