EXHIBITIONS.

In all the Provinces, except Prince Edward Island, there are exhibitions. The best of everything produced, outside of P. E. Island, will be shown, noted, examined, and talked about; the methods by which their superiority was achieved will be discussed and applied in the future to the benefit of individuals in particular and the country at large. The Exhibition is a great object lesson. We heartily agree with the commercial paper which says that the exhibition is productive of much good and its encouragement is therefore most desirable. The ambitious schoolboy adapts himself to persevering study because he is desirous of winning a prize. It is not the value of the prize he covets, but the name of excelling in competition nerves his energy and he uses all his powers in the hope of accomplishing his aim. In doing this he is adding to his own worth and to the worth of the country. Similar additions are the recognized worth of the man or the firm who attains to a higher level of achievement in the manufacture of articles of use or the growth of any commodity. The farm waggon, buggy, or sleigh that takes first prize at the Fair is supposed to have been judged on its merits by those most competent, consequently its superior make being no longer a secret to those who have attended, this knowledge has become generally circulated and thus has learning been diffused. The farmer who takes the highest prize for grain knows what condition the soil was in that brought it forth, while the raiser of the best flock of sheep is convinced that his attention and mode of feeding must have been the best in order to have produced the best results. In every line a lesson is taught, and that lesson is deeply impressed on the minds of those visitors interested in like pursuits. They know how far they are behind, or they pride themselves on being so near the front. They see not only the highest production in all commodities but are being made acquainted with ideas that had before been foreign to their thoughts. Each is shown where, by diligence and study, he can become equal to the best, an attainment which means greater profit in his work, and less rough labor in the accomplishment of his aims. Encouraging the exhibition is 'encouraging the best interests of the Dominion.'

But the government of P. E. Island, as a result of its corruption and bad management, is now too poor to encourage the best interests of this agricultural Province. Our exhibition buildings and sheds are to be empty and silent and useless. Some one has suggested that the grounds had better be donated to the citizens of Charlottetown for a park at the East End. But it is probable that the owners will await the event of a change of administration.

While Quebec holds the Master of the Administration and has great influence at Ottawa the people of Quebec are by no means satisfied with the make up of the Laurier-Tarte ministry. It was recently stated in a meeting held at Montreal that "such Ministers as Messrs Tarte, Dobell and Fitzpatrick were utterly hated by the Rouges." As for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the French Canadian speaker continued, "he had no sympathy for his own nationality. When in England on Jubilee Day, the Federal Premier in all his speeches, had been unable to make one single utterance in favour of French Canada."

At a meeting held in Montreal the other day it was declared that "the \$60,000,000 session would kill the government."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Montreal Gazette states that the Quebec bridge will cost, with connections, between \$4,000,000, and \$7,000,000.

Referring to the letter of "Disappointed," published yesterday, we are informed that the mail for the western express closes at 8.10 each morning. It is hardly necessary to add that a postoffice clerk is to be commended rather than blamed for being "sharp on time."

It has been remarked that the present reign of the Liberal party at Ottawa has been fruitful in catch phrases, if nothing else. To Mr. Pettit's "Business is business," and Mr. Preston's "Hug the machine," the Moncton Transcript's "Every day has been a picnic day," is not unworthy of being added. With the Government spending between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000 a year, too, the picnic is, as The Gazette remarks, no mean one.

The despatches show that the North Waterloo election was fully as corrupt on the part of the Liberals as those of West Huron, West Elgin and Brockville. The trail of the serpent is over them all. One virtuous man got fifty dollars for his vote and the promise of a hundred more if the Liberal vote in his district showed an increase of ten over the last election. After the election he received the promised hundred. While the Liberals are in office, they have plenty of money to spend at elections. Where do they get it?

A SETTLEMENT MADE—At the regular meeting of the Town Council of Summerside held last night a settlement was arrived at with the bondsmen of W. K. McKay, late Town Clerk. The defalcations amount to about four thousand dollars. The bonds for one thousand dollars each and over two years. The amount to be paid by the sureties is twelve hundred dollars for a full discharge. It will be remembered, at the time the defalcations were discovered, great credit was claimed for the council for securing a mortgage from the late clerk and his father which secured them in an additional sum of one thousand dollars. This mortgage is now assigned to the sureties without any consideration beyond the twelve hundred dollars above referred to. Each party pays their own cash.
