THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

GOD'S GRACE MAKES MAN SHARER IN DIVINE NATURE
 God's Divine revelation to the human race contained in Holy Scripture includes some truths which stagger the reason of man. When the human mind grasps even imperfectly what God is saying, it fears almost to take it literally, and looks for some inter- pretation other than a literal one. This is not surprising; how could man's puny intellect fail to do other- wise than tremble in the pres- ence of the Divine Mind?

Yet even when it trembles the human intellect must not confuse God's ways and thoughts. God is all-powerful, all-wise and all-good. When He tells us what He wishes to do with His creatures and the gifts He will bestow upon them it is our duty not to dispute or argue, but to accept gratefully, fully believing in His ability to do what He promises.

Now, among these staggering truths, certainly we can include the doctrine that by sanctifying grace we are made partakers of the Divine Nature. St. Peter, in his Second Epistle, clearly reveals this: "That by these you may be made partakers of the Divine Nature." It is akin to the teaching that we are sons of God, because it is by generation and birth that nature communicates itself from one being to another.

Some have claimed that we only participate in the Divine Nature morally, i.e., by imitation; but this is not true. Such an interpretation is another example

of the timidity of man fearful of taking God in His Word. In reality, our participation in the nature of God is what we call a physical one. By physical partici- pation is not meant that the Di- vine essence is communicated to man as the human nature of par- ents is communicated to the child. What is meant is that our partici- pation is an accidental one—a par- ticipation by similitude. It is a gift distinct from the Divine Na- ture.

ADOPTED SONS
 A parallel idea is contained in the fact of our sonship of God. We are the sons of God—not, how- ever, begotten from all eternity as is the Only-Begotten Son of God, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, but we are the adopted sons of God.

We are not gods. We remain men and our participation in the Di- vine Nature is accidental. There is an infinite difference between the Divine Nature, considered in Itself, and considered in us by participation. The former is Sub- stance; the latter an accident. The former is Pure Act; the latter a quality inhering in the substance of the soul, so that which is substantially in God, is accidentally in the soul participating in the Divine Goodness.

Now, is it possible for the human mind to grasp even imperfectly how this can be done? To some extent yes. The Divine Nature is considered the principle of all God's operations, but particularly of His Knowledge of Himself and Love of Himself. Grace in our soul is a principle of our knowl- edge of God and our love of Him.

Thus, by means of grace we are made capable of performing the very acts which God Himself performs—we can know and love Him not merely as humans, but in a way as He knows and loves Himself—we participate in the intimate activity of the Holy Trinity Itself.

If two persons know that two and two make four, they partici- pate in the same knowledge. So, if we know God as God knows Him- self, God and ourselves can be said to participate in the Knowledge of God.

Similarly, two persons who love the same thing in the same way participate in the love of that thing. So, if we love God, and God loves Himself, we can be said to participate in the love of God. By grace we know God and we love Him, i.e., we share in His activity.

But God is a simple Substance and the distinction between His Activity and His Nature is mental rather than real. His Activity is His Nature. Hence by sharing in His Activity we are actually shar- ing physically in the Divine Na- ture. In this sense, then, does grace make us "partakers of the Divine Nature" according to the words of St. Peter.

"Go Ye Therefore"
 David Livingstone, who obeyed the above command, said of the above promise: "It is the word of a Christian gentle- man!"

Livingstone proved across the thousands of lonely African miles that Jesus Christ was with him. Once when a mis- sion station wrote him: "When you have found a good road to where you are we will send some other men to join you." Livingstone replied, "I only want men who will come even if there is no road."
