

Margaret Truman To Wed Newspaper Man In April

NEW YORK (AP)—Displaying proudly a modest diamond solitaire, Margaret Truman said Monday she and newspaper man Giffon Daniel will be married some time in April.

Two hours after former president Harry S. Truman had announced his only child's engagement, Margaret and her fiancé met the press here in a public room of the Hotel Carlyle, where she lives.

Miss Truman, 32, said there will be a small quiet wedding with the two families' at Trinity Episcopal church in Independence, Mo. The wedding date has not yet been fixed. There will be no "big, white, formal bridal gown," either, Miss Truman continued, because "I never have liked that kind of thing."

Daniel, 43, an assistant to the foreign news editor of The New York Times and a former European correspondent, sat beside Miss Truman answering a few questions. Son of a Zebulon, N.C., druggist, Daniel is a slender, handsome, brown-eyed man of medium height with greying hair. Like Margaret, he has not been married before.

Sometimes with reluctance, they patched together the story of their romance which started in early November when they met at the home of George Backer, former New York Post publisher.

Daniel proposed late in January and he met his prospective father-in-law, Harry S. Truman, for the first time when the former president came to New York last month to speak at a Democratic dinner.

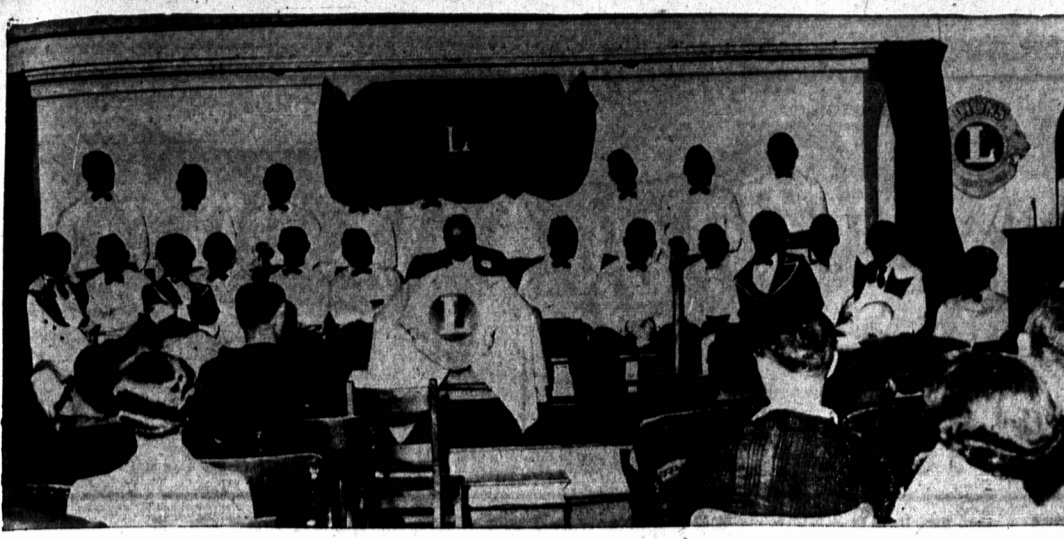
"Mother and dad were delighted," added Margaret, "but I can't remember what he said when we told him we were going to be married."

Alberton Had Large Surplus For Year, Council Is Informed

Mayor H.E. Barbour presided and all councillors were in attendance at the regular meeting of the Alberton Town Council last night. Bills were presented and the minutes read by the town clerk, Henry Clarke.

The police report showed one arrest during the month.

Councillor Nicholson reported on his attendance at a town planning meeting in Charlottetown.

Herbert Matthews, chairman of the street committee, once again brought up the serious problem presented by vehicles being left parked on town streets overnight, or for some days, greatly hampering the work of the snow plow. The town policeman is to be instructed to enforce the by-law against overnight parking on any and all streets.

On motion it was approved that licenses, fees and the tax rates of Alberton be the same as those of farms all remain the same.

The financial statement for the year ending Dec. 31, 1955, showed total revenue of \$7,047.51 with a surplus of \$4,968.01. It was noted that 40 per cent of the surplus was made up of arrears of taxes. Fire and other equipment such as a new hose, pumper, water storage dam and tank on fire truck amounted to \$1,998.24.

Following discussion the council decided to keep in touch with the work of the West Prince Board of Trade in their efforts to have the Alberton harbour improved with a view to assisting in any way they could.

S'ide Council Asks Cost Of Old P.O. For Town Offices

Approval was given by the Summerside Town Council last evening to a resolution in regard to the calling of tenders to determine the cost that would be involved in renovations and repairs to the old post office building in order to make it suitable for town offices.

The meeting, which was presided over by Mayor W.A. Currie and attended by all councillors, gave permission to the Imperial Oil Ltd. to make renovations and additions and improvements to their bulk storage facilities on Harvard Street, provided they meet with the standards of the Dominion Board of Insurance Underwriters, and on condition that a statement of the costs be furnished to the town clerk on completion of the work.

A decision was made to sell by tender approximately 65,000 pounds of copper wire which was salvaged from electrical lines and which is unfit for further use in line construction or repairs.

A block of land owned by the town situated on Harvard Street and suitable for town offices, approximately 9-10 of an acre, will be advertised for sale. The council will require the erection of a fence around this land in accordance with their wishes, if the property is sold.

George W. Muttart and W. A. Gaudet were appointed assessors for the town for the 1956 assessment and this work is to begin at once and be completed not later than June 10th.

In correspondence dealt with by the meeting, a letter was read from Mr. D.O. Stewart, chairman of the Board of School Trustees, outlining an estimate of requirement on capital and operating expenses for the high school and the new school.

The board estimated that \$17,000 would be required for capital expenditure for the year. This would include new boilers in the heating system of the old school, and equipment for classrooms and lab in the new high school.

It was estimated that \$61,000 would be required on ordinary account for teacher's salaries and operating expenses for both the present high school and the new high school.

In line with a request made by Mayor Currie at the previous meeting, a letter was read from the various committees of which they are chairmen.

In his report as chairman of the electric light committee, Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark described the progress being made by the repair crew working on the rural lines. His report indicated that all a.s.s. served by the Summerside electric light plant should have power restored by the end of this week.
