China Going After Fish

HONG KONG (Reuters)—Communist China has plans to modernize fishing methods in a bid to outstrip Japan as the biggest fish-producing nation in the world, the New China news agency reported Saturday.

Japan's industry produces about 5,000,000 tons of fish products a year. China caught a total of 2,950,000 tons last year.

By the end of China's second five-year plan in 1962 the annual output of fish is expected to reach 20,000,000 tons, the agency claimed.

Development projects include plans to fit traditional sail-powered junks with motors, the use of plastics for nets and lines, more emphasis on fresh-water fishing and new incentives for

fishermen's co-operatives. The co-operatives have 4,500,000 members and their output accounts for more than 90 per cent of China's total marine fisheries output.
