#### Mate Who Works Alone Can Concentrate Better

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: My husband has changed jobs twice in the past 10 years and in each situation he has had to share his small office with his secretary.

This affects his work, because he concentrates better when alone; but there is a shortage of office space. His disposition suffers and he spends many nights doing his day's work.

Business organizations never should permit this kind of inconvenience. What happens if the husband or the secretary is fickle? I would appreciate your comment. Sincerely, D. B.

DEAR D. B.: If your husband's work requires concentration, hence privacy, and if his job status rates full-time secretarial help, I can't believe that he lacks veto-power, if he cares to use it, concerning his being crowded into a small office with his girl Friday.

I think that he could, if he wished, negotiate his way into a cubbyhole of his very own, behind a closed door, with the secretary anchored outside the barricade, to handle her chores.

Incidentally in changing jobs twice in 10 years, did your husband change secretaries too? Or did he take the same girl with him? The point isn't clear in your letter; and maybe it has no relevance.

As to the complaint of him spending nights doing his day's work, theoretically because he can't do justice to the work unless he's alone with it, I'm wondering does he put in this overtime at home? Or at the office?

If he spends these evenings at home, keeping up with his work deadlines, perhaps he's sincere in his complaints.

Yet he expects you to really believe that he really feels he has a space-grievance, he ought to take the complaint to the management and ask for either adequate working conditions, or overtime pay for overtime work for as long as the hardship continues.

Now to consider your crux-question, the nub of the space-problem from your angle, namely: What happens if the man or the secretary is fickle (meaning easy prey to flirtatious advances, I take it)?—well, in that case the set-up is inadvisable obviously.

It is a situation wired, so to speak, with troublesome potentials for both parties. Hence, it is a situation that the prudent husband or the self-respecting secretary will evacuate, as quickly as decisive action can bring it about. M. H.

#### East India Touch - High Styled Curries

Curries are high style among contemporary foods. Based on a smartly tasty sauce, they can be prepared with beef, lamb, veal, chicken, eggs, fish, seafood vegetables or even game, and are traditionally served on rice. For modern service, wild rice or a combination is favored.

Today the Chef and I suggest lamb curry with "Dhall," the famous additional East Indian curry sauce based on dried lentils or split green peas.

LAMB CURRY DINNER FOR TOMORROW  
Chilled Mango Juice or Tangerine Juice  
Lamb Curry with Dhall (optional)  
Fairy Long Grain Rice  
Coconut Cake  
or Honeydew Melon Wedges  
Coffee or Tea  
Measurements level; recipes for 6

Indian currie sauce is the basis for all East Indian curries. The vegetables, apple and chutney add flavor and interesting texture.

INDIAN CURRY SAUCE  
3 tsp. butter or margarine  
1/4 c. thin-sliced onion  
1/4 c. thin-sliced peeled carrot  
1/4 c. small-cut green peas  
1 1/2 tsp. curry powder  
3 tsp. flour  
2 1/2 c. mashed canned tomato  
3 c. boiling water  
2 tsp. beef bouillon powder  
1/4 c. fine-chopped, peeled tart apple  
1 tsp. medium-chopped chutney with syrup  
Melt butter; add onion, car-

rot and beans; slow-fry until color turns. Stir in curry powder. Stir 1/2 min. more over low heat. At once, mix in flour stir in tomato, water and bouillon powder; add apple and chutney. Simmer-boil 10 min.

Note: If a smooth sauce is preferred, rub through a sieve. For a "hotter" sauce add more curry powder.

LAMB CURRY  
1 recipe Indian curry sauce (columned).  
3 lb. boned, defatted breast of lamb, cut in bite size pieces  
2 tsp. butter or margarine  
1 tsp. lemon juice  
1 recipe long grain flaky rice (see pkg. directions) Dhall (optional)

First, prepare sauce; next lightly brown prepared lamb in butter. Stir in curry sauce; cover; simmer 1 hr. Stir in lemon juice. Serve with rice, and pass Dhall.

DHALL  
This is curry sauce made from protein-rich lentils or split green peas.  
1 1/2 qt. boiling water  
1 c. pkg. dried green lentils or green peas  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. ground cardamom seed  
1/4 tsp. ground love  
1/4 tsp. fine-crushed bay leaf  
1/4 tsp. garlic powder  
3 tsp. butter
