Playboy's Editor Said Intelligent

HAMILTON (CP) Dr. H.G. Cox, an assistant professor at Harvard Divinity School, says Hugh Hefner, editor of Playboy magazine, is a sincere, intelligent man who doesn't appear to be able to enjoy the company of women.

The Baptist theologian told the second North American Conference on Church and Family here that it is obvious Hefner and readers of his magazine have an "adversive or 'sub-sevent' attitude to sex."

Dr. Cox has known the magazine editor for more than three years and has been a guest several times at his plush bunny-girl-filled club in Chicago.

He said Hefner apparently tries to give the impression in his magazine that the bunny girls in the club are a sort of personal harem.

"But it has always been my experience that people who do most of the talking about things like that are the people whose sex activities are the least exciting," Dr. Cox said in an interview.

He said he was once arguing with Hefner in his living-room when a group of scantily-clad bunny girls passed through on the way to the indoor swimming pool.

"My eyes nearly popped out of my head, but Hefner didn't even look up and didn't miss a syllable," he said. "It's pretty sad. If you don't even look up anymore, you've lost something."

He described Hefner as one "obsessed with his philosophy and his magazine."

CARS BURNED IN DOCK INCIDENTS

Four cars were set on fire early Sunday in Quebec harbor, during a series of incidents. A group of longshoremen on strike was protesting against the presence of about 100 municipal policemen at the entrance of the port.

CBC Reviews Feasibility Of Continuing Seven Days

OTTAWA (CP) - CBC management is reviewing the feasibility of producing its controversial television program "Seven Days" next season, President Alphonse Ouimet told the Commons broadcasting committee.

Mr. Ouimet said the review is necessary because Douglas Letterman, the show's executive producer, has challenged the corporation's authority and policy in recent statements about the dispute over "Seven Days." It is hoped the review will be completed by the end of the month.

The corporation president denied Thursday that the CBC intends to drop the program next season.

He said Mr. Letterman has said producers should be given the right to give editorial opinion on programs and have defended the use of extra-legal methods to obtain information for programs.

NOT ACCEPTABLE
"Such views are unacceptable to the corporation," Mr. Ouimet said.

The CBC president also said the corporation will not submit the question of its handling of the removal of the co-hosts - Patrick Watson and Laurier Lapiere - to arbitration.

He added that W.E.S. (Captain) Briggs, senior vice-president, is writing to Stuart Keate to say that the publisher misquoted him in his report to Prime Minister Pearson on the dispute.

Mr. Ouimet said it would be a dangerous precedent to bow to producers' demands that the handling of the removal of the co-hosts be submitted to an outside arbiter.

ANGELICAN SYNOD INFORMED

Central Agency Is Needed

TORONTO (CP) - The annual synod of the Anglican Church of Toronto diocese has been told that the International Anglican Communion of 19 independent churches should have a Roman Catholic-like central headquarters to direct church efforts around the world.

Rev. R.S. Dean, the communion's executive officer, informed the 300 delegates that he had already taken a step in this direction by selecting seven advisers from various areas around the world. One of them is the Canadian Primate, Most Rev. Howard H. Clark, Archbishop of Rupert's Land.

Bishop Dean, who is Bishop of the Cariboo when in Canada, toured the world four times in the last 18 months, collecting some 1,100 supposedly "emergency" projects. He advocated a "strategist with authority" to deal with this kind of piecemeal church work, and admonished the church to stick to priorities.

The synod also heard the Anglican Church accused of being at least a decade behind the sexual revolution in America. In an address Wednesday night, Rev. F.G. Ongley of Oshawa said that "the clergy are confused and the Council for Social Service must help the clergy cope with their changing role."

Rev. J.F. O'Neil, chairman of the Anglican social service centre, said the centre will soon begin a round-the-clock service, similar to that operated by the Salvation Army to help those in despair. He said the Salvation Army will provide guidance for the preparation of the service.

SEES MORALITY DECLINE
Rev. M.F. Patterson, rector of St. James the Just Church in suburban Downsview, told the meeting that adult morality in Toronto and other cities make Peyton Place look like life in a convent.

The late Grace Metcalfe caused a stir a few years ago with her best-selling novel Peyton Place which was about life in a small New England town.

Mr. Patterson said much of the loose morals of youth could be attributed to the lack of adult morality and to "the utter naivete" they see on television.

He specifically condemned last Sunday's CBC production, Youth In Search of Morality.

He deplored what he called "the colossal fall" of a minister in the show who said if he was approached by a couple about pre-marital sexual intercourse,

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CO-OPERATION SEEN IN EXPO

LONDON (CP) - Canada's Expo 67 will show the world the most concrete example of Christian co-operation on a single project since the Christian church split 912 years ago, say four Montreal clergymen visiting Britain.

Representatives of the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Baptist and Lutheran Churches, headed by Very Rev. William Bothwell, Anglican dean of Montreal, told 13 British clergymen of the aims of Expo's Christian pavilion, a showcase of the ecumenical spirit involving seven denominations.

Dr. Bothwell said in an interview the meeting in a Canadian government office here had produced "great interest" and lively questioning from the British clergymen.

Describing the pavilion as "the first concrete example of ecumenism" since the Christian church divided between eastern and western rites in 1054, Dr. Bothwell said it was a significant venture for the contemporary world.

The pavilion would attempt to show, through photographs and sound effects, a picture of man's essential situation and problems.

WANT CHINESE SOLDIERS

CARACAS (Reuters) - The exiled Cuban workers organization in Venezuela said Saturday night that Cuban Premier Fidel Castro is negotiating the entry of 150,000 Chinese soldiers into Cuba, in a statement published here. The Democratic Revolutionary Cuban Workers Front said Castro's recent warning of an impending attack on a plot to justify the entry of 150,000 Chinese soldiers which is being negotiated with Communist China.

BURLESQUE MAKES RETURN TO N.Y. THEATRE SCENE

NEW YORK (AP) - After a long absence from New York City, burlesque is back with a bump and a grind.

Within the last year four theatres have opened and a fifth is to open next month.

The breakthrough came from Ann Corio, who staged "This Was Burlesque" off Broadway in 1962. The show packed them in for three years.

The big assault was launched by Leroy C. Griffith, one-time concession manager for Harold Minsky's burlesque houses in Chicago. Griffith, 34, controls three theatres here and another 31 across the United States.

SANNED IN 1937
The shows are back, but is it the same burlesque that Mayor Fiorello La Guardia bootied out of town in 1937?

Gone are the production numbers, the chorus girls, the scenery and all but the most essential props. Gone, too, is the raucous that prompted La Guardia to act.

"What you see in a burlesque theatre today you could probably see on television," said Dave Cohn, a booking agent who calls himself "The King of the Exotics."

"An exotic is what an ecologist is called today. Strip teases is a little crude," said Carmella Rickman, a beauty billed as "The Sophia Loren of Burlesk."

The inevitable question is: How does a stripper feel about undressing on stage?

IDEA IS TO TEASE
"I enjoy doing a show covered," said Carmella. "I'm too nervous if I'm too nude. Some girls enjoy uncovering, but I don't. I think the idea is to tease."

She took up stripping 10 years ago and expects to be at it for a few more years, at least until her two children get through college.

As Griffith sees it the reason for the comeback is simple: "Burlesque is a poor man's entertainment that rich people enjoy."

Sally Rand at 61 still is doing her famous fan dance, this time at a theatre in the borough of Queens.

KILLS SELF BY FIRE

HELSINKI (Reuters) - A Finnish woman burned herself to death Saturday night, shortly after watching a television program showing a Buddhist monk in Viet Nam dying this way.

Mrs. Sivi Sorjansalo of Ukkola poured gasoline over herself and set fire to it. She was found by her 14-year-old daughter and a neighbor. The reason for her action was not known.

FOUR DROWN IN LAKE

VILLE MARIE, Que. (CP) - Three men and a woman were drowned Friday in Lake Narrows eight miles from this community, police said Saturday.

They were identified as Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Baur, aged 27 and 25, Carl Baur, 72, and Raymond Horning, 65. Police said the four, believed to have been on a fishing trip, were from Ohio.

WEED SPRAYING Facts

Use the RIGHT Rate

Poor weed kills are usually the result of spraying at too low a rate. The lowest rate in the tables is recommended only for easy-to-kill weeds. Usually other more resistant weeds are present and higher rates are necessary. The rate necessary will depend on the weeds. Higher rates are necessary also when weather is cool or dry and when weed infestation is heavy. Do not expect the lowest rate to control all weeds.
