Harry O'Brien, Well Known Alberton Horseman, Passes

ALBERTON — Harry O'Brien of Alberton, well known Prince Edward Island horseman, died last evening in a Charlottetown hospital where he had been a patient for several months.

Mr. O'Brien belonged to a family of horsemen and was the father of Joe O'Brien who has won international fame in the harness racing field. He himself loved horses and continued to train them on his own track in Alberton until a couple of years ago. He was also an expert on race tracks and it was he who was chosen to lay out the Sydney Speedway which is said to be one of the finest in Eastern Canada.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James O'Brien, he was born at Elmadaie, 18 years ago. In 1903 he was married to Miss Jennie Foley of Kildare. The first 10 years of their married life was spent in Elmadaie. About 48 years ago they moved to Alberton. Mrs. O'Brien predeceased her husband in 1959.

Surviving are four sons and two daughters, William of New York, N.J. who is at present in Alberton, Ray in Montreal, Claude in Charlottetown, Joseph in San Jose, Calif., Mrs. John C. Profit (Doris) in Alberton, and

Provincial, Prince Co. Plowing Matches Set

ALBERTON — The provincial plowing championships will be held for the first time in O'Leary, Wednesday, Oct. 24, the day following the fifth annual Prince County match all of which have been run off in O'Leary.

Both events will take place on the farm of Alvin Palmer in Mount Royal, two miles southwest of O'Leary.

Competition in the Prince County match is expected to get underway at noon Tuesday and carry over into the second day when the winner and runner-up will compete with Kings County champions, Edwin Mills of Bay Fortune and Wendal MacLean, Forest Hill and Queens County champions Beverley Morrissey, Cherry Valley and Stanley Wilks of Cornwall.

In the four year history of the Prince County match, several winners have been Edward MacMillan, Howland; Arthur Hudson, Accompany; Arnold Smallman, Krutsoford and Donald Platts of Howland.

The chief supervisor of the events is Raynald MacNeill, president of the P.E.I. Plowing Council.

Theris Ellis is president of the Prince County match with Bernard Goss as secretary. The Prince County directors have extended a hearty invitation to plowmen from all parts of the county to compete in the matches. Most generous prizes have been provided and there are also trophies and trays for top winners.

Refreshments will be available on the grounds.

Officers Testify in Lobster Case

SUMMERSIDE — Evidence on behalf of the department of fisheries was completed yesterday afternoon before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court in the case of Charles Patrick Powers, Alberton, South, charged with possession of 726 undersized lobsters.

Defence counsel was J. Watson MacNaught, QC, while the case for the department of fisheries was conducted by George R. McMahon.

Fisheries Officer Donald MacKinnon testified that he, in company with officers Shirley Doane and Weldon Ingalls came upon two men cooking lobsters by some woods between Campbellton and Howard's Cove, Sept. 15.

When the two men sensed that the fisheries officers were present, they got up and ran off across the field. Officers MacKinnon and Doane gave chase. They caught up with one man who identified himself as Powers, but the other person escaped.

The officers took Powers back to the scene where the cooking had been going on and Powers explained the operation. In brief, the officers found 536 live and 250 partly cooked undersized lobsters. They also seized the cooking equipment that consisted of a flame burner, water tank and other equipment.

Fisheries Officers Doane and Ingalls also testified to complete the fisheries department evidence. The case was adjourned to Oct. 17 at which time evidence for the defence will be heard.

RCMP Arrest Brothers At Sea Cow Pond — Two brothers, Earl Joseph Brennan, 28, and Donald Joseph Brennan, 19, have been placed under arrest by RCMP in connection with the death of Roy Hackett of North Cape.

The elder of the two brothers lives in Sea Cow Pond and is expected to be charged with manslaughter while the younger brother is expected to face charges of criminal negligence. The pair were arrested by RCMP Wednesday night and are lodged in Prince County jail at Summerside.
