He Will go to Ottawa To-Night.

HAS BEEN ENGAGED ON MATTERS OF GREAT IMPORTANCE.

Appointed Organizer for Montreal.

MONTREAL, Feb. 3.—Sir Charles Tupper will go to Ottawa to-night, after spending several days in this city. While here he has been busily engaged in matters of great importance to the Conservative party. His work has been on lines of organization, preparatory to the next general election campaign.

Sir Charles, with approval of his party friends here, has appointed Henry Dalby as organizer of the English portion of the Conservative party here, to devote his whole time to this work. Mr. Dalby has resigned his position as Managing Editor of the Montreal Daily Star with which paper he has been connected for twenty years.

FUNERAL OF VICTOR LIDDELL.—The funeral of the late Victor Liddell took place from St. Luke's Cathedral yesterday afternoon, and quite a large concourse of citizens followed the remains to the grave. Services were held by the Rev. E. P. Crawford and the interment took place in Camp Hill cemetery. The casket was covered with numerous floral offerings, among which were tributes from the hockeyists of St. John and Amherst, of appropriate designs, and also from his brother officials in the bank.—Halifax Chronicle.

BANKING AT HAVANA.—Some time ago there was talk of the Bank of Nova Scotia establishing a branch in Havana. Mr. H. C. McLeod, after investigation, reported against doing so, and the project was abandoned. The Merchant's Bank of Halifax have now decided to enter that field. E. L. Pease, manager of one of the Merchants' Bank agencies, in Montreal, left last week for Havana, the bearer of instructions from the board of directors to open a branch of the bank in the city of Havana. Mr. Brook, the bank's inspector, has been in the capital for some time. It is understood that the Merchants' Bank agent now at Fredericton has been slated for the Havana agency. The Havana agency will be a joint one; that is that a resident of Havana will be associated as joint manager with the regular agent to be sent down from the bank at Halifax.

PRESENTATION AT NORTH RIVER

Upon returning from the prayer meeting on Wednesday evening, the Rev. A. F. Browne, of North River, found the parsonage in possession of a large number of friends, who had come with ample provision for a bountiful supper and a good time generally—and also, as soon appeared, for a more important purpose. Shortly after eight o'clock the meeting was called to order by Mr. Reuben Barrett, of Kingston. Mr. William Fraser, of Linwood was made chairman. After a few pleasant remarks he called upon Wm. Scott Esq., of Clyde River, who, in an extremely witty and eloquent speech, stated the real object of the gathering. According to Mr. Scott, Mr. Browne is a worthy successor of John the Baptist. As we read in Scripture, the herald of Christ wore a coat made from camel's hair. On Prince Edward Island such a coat would not be found. But there are other animals whose hair is especially fitted for garments, and as a token of their respect for their pastor in his work and their desire for his comfort, while taking the long drives necessary in his large field, they had come to provide him with the best known protection against cold and storm. At this point Mr. Benj. Ward, of Kingston, stepped forward and enveloped Mr. Browne in an elegant fur coat, a present from his congregations in Kingston and Clyde River. The chairman declared that he spoke the minds of all present, when he expressed a hope that the present highly satisfactory relations between pastor and people might continue until the coat should be entirely worn out. Mr. Daniel Fraser, of Kingston and others had a prominent part in this very successful enterprise.

THE RUSSIAN WAY.—They deal with a strike very drastically in St. Petersburg. Strikers in a cotton mill resisted the police and killed one. The Cossacks were called in. In the face of bricks, boiling water and other things they stormed the workmen's barracks, cornered the strikers in the garret, flogged men, women and children indiscriminately, and arrested 200 men. Trades unionism seems to cut a sorry figure in the land of the Czars.

CURIOSITIES OF OUR CALENDAR.—There are some curious facts about our calendar. No century can begin on Wednesday, Friday, or Sunday. The same calendars can be used every twenty years. October always begins on the same day of the week as January, April as July, September as December. February, March and November begin on the same days. May, June and August always begin on different days from each other and every other month in the year. The first and last days of the year are always the same. These rules do not apply to leap year, when comparison is made between days before and after February 29th.—Exchange.

STILL VERY MUCH ALIVE.

A short time ago a paragraph went the rounds of the press to the effect that a Mr. Schurman, of Prince Edward Island, had lost his life at Manila, in the Philippines. We are glad to learn that the report is not correct. A letter from Mr. Stephen Schurman, a brother of the supposed dead man, to C. C. Gardiner, Esq., of this city, contains the following:—

"A few days since a letter came from my brother at Manila. He said he had read a notice of his death in a California paper, but that he was still very much alive,— though he had been a month in hospital with fever and had several close calls during the siege and capture of Manila. Once, he said, a shell passed over his head and burst just behind him. Another time a rifle bullet just missed his head and wounded the Captain behind him."

It is worthy of remark that the Mr. Schurman referred to is a second cousin of Dr. Schurman who is now on his way, as Chairman of the United States National Commission, to report upon the Philippines. They will meet at Manila.
