Sales Tax Rebating Creating Confusion

Complications in bookkeeping are resulting in the building industry due to the federal government's changes in sales tax on building materials.

George Chandler of Chandler Brothers Limited said yesterday "the whole industry, including manufacturers, suppliers, wholesalers and retailers, is confused and upset." He said the changes have created "one of the greatest schisms in the bookkeeping ever faced by the industry."

At Chandler Brothers, prices were adjusted on materials received after June 14 to comply with the 11 per cent federal sales tax. "According to announcements from Ottawa following the decision to reduce the tax to four per cent, it was inferred that buyers could claim a tax rebate," Mr. Chandler said. "It is likely that we will be approached for rebates but we have had no instructions as to how the company can claim a rebate on its purchases. The whole matter needs clarification and persons in the building industry are playing it by ear, waiting for a clarification."

Another problem faced by the industry because of tax changes is compiling new price lists. "It is a job of work," said Mr. Chandler, "when you carry between 2,000 and 3,000 items in stock."

Breach Of Contract Hearing Is Adjourned For Argument

A civil action involving alleged breach of contract and damages for damages was opened yesterday in Supreme Court, Charlottetown, before Mr. Justice R.B. Bell, was adjourned to a date to be fixed for argument by agreement of the parties.

In the action, Raymond G. Burghard of Bergenfield, N. Jersey, is seeking damages in the amount of \$8,000 from the Cuckoost Farm Equipment Limited, alleged breach of contract by the firm.

In his testimony Mr. Burghard claims there is a breach of an agreement, which was dated May 1, 1956, and as a result he was forced to pay out the sum of \$8,000 for damages.

For its part the company claims that the agreement of Mr. Justice R.B. Bell, was adjourned to a date to be fixed for argument by agreement of the parties.

The company also claims that the loss sustained by Mr. Burghard was not a result of either their breach of contract or negligence.

The plaintiff is M. Alban Farmer, QC, and the defendant company is represented by Allan G. Gillis.

Three Assault Cases Heard By Magistrate At Souris
