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Pope Pius Slashes Vatican Expenses

ROME, June 22.—The high cost of living, coupled with the decreased contributions of "Peter's pence" from Austria and Belgium, which were generous before the war, has forced Pope Pius to institute the most stringent economy.

His Holiness, who personally inspected these accounts recently, found several items in them that should be cut down, so he issued a command that henceforth no extraordinary expenses should be allowed unless absolutely necessary.

The Pope was particularly severe about the expenses incurred by the Technical Office, charged with the upkeep of the palaces and St. Peter's by the Quartermaster's Department. To prevent the recurrence of expenses which the Pope, so simple and severe in private life, thinks excessive, he now forbids any extra expenditure above \$25-500 lire—unless it is approved by a special committee composed of Cardinals Gasparri, Merry de Val, de Lai and Sbarretti.

The Papal flat was received by the Vatican staff with intense surprise and some subdued murmurs for such measures are unknown in the history of the domestic economy of the palaces.

This incident marks the second clash between the Pope and the devotion to his entourage to traditions. The first was when he introduced Signora Linda, the mother of his old housekeeper, and gave her a home near his own apartments where she supervises the wardrobe and kitchen.

Animals Affected Again By Disease

LONDON, June 22.—Foot and mouth disease has again broken out among animals in this country, this being the worst outbreak yet reported to the Board of Agriculture. The peak has occurred in the Derbyshire area, where over 100 animals have been certified affected by the disease.

Slaughtering has begun with a view to preventing the spread of the infection and urgent restrictions have been issued to the same end. A fresh outbreak among pigs is reported from Birmingham. In March last, when it was thought the disease was about stamping out, the Ministry of Agriculture estimates that the cost of overcoming the foot and mouth outbreak was about £1,000,000.

Good Fish Story, Official Declares

OTTAWA, Ont., June 22.—Officials of the Federal Department of Fisheries are not prepared to admit the accuracy of the most recent explanation of the presence and death in Lake Ontario of millions of young shad. That explanation was that consignments of shad fry, intended by the Fisheries Department for the British Columbia coast and of fresh water herring fry, intended for Lake Ontario, had got mixed last Autumn, with the result that the shad had been liberated in Lake Ontario and the herring in the Pacific Ocean.

To Dam The Jordan At Sea Of Galilee

JERUSALEM, June 22.—Much of the material that is to be used in the work of developing the hydroelectric power of the falls of the Jordan, near the Sea of Galilee, will be acquired from German firms. Their prices are said to be one-half those of British houses and the considerably below those of American bidders.

The plan includes the construction of a dam on the Jordan River at the point where it issues from the Sea of Galilee; a large storage reservoir; irrigation canals and the installation of electric generating stations. American-Jewish organizations are said to be largely interested in the project. The contract has been awarded to Pinhas Rutenberg, a Russian engineer, by the British Government. Mr. Rutenberg is now in the United States, seeking financial support for the project. The work will involve an expenditure of \$10,000,000 and the employment of 8,000 men. The Russian contractor also will undertake to draw electric power from the Aija River, to light the ancient city of Jaffa and the communities of Tel Aviv, Ramleh and Petach Tikvah. He is allowed two years in which to raise the capital and start operations.

WILL HANG MEN GUILTY OF ARSON

LONDON, June 22.—The campaign of incendiarism in Belfast has become so alarming, says the Morning Post's correspondent, that when the Ulster parliament reassembles on Tuesday the northern government is likely to introduce legislation imposing the death penalty on persons convicted of setting fires. The writer ascribes the burnings to a plot to strangle the industrial life of Belfast by destroying manufacturing and business premises.

COL. HOULISTON NOW IN CHARGE.

ST. JOHN, June 22.—Col. Alexander Thomas Ogilvie, D. S. O., officer commanding Military District No. 7, has received official word from Ottawa that the matter of his retirement had been passed and he will go today on leave pending retirement. He said yesterday that he would live in Victoria, B. C., and on his way there would visit Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and other cities.

Colonel John Houliston, D. S. O., who has been in the city for some time, now will take over Colonel Ogilvie's post as colonel commanding of the district. Colonel Houliston has been in the militia since the time he graduated from the Royal Military College. He was for some time in command of the 86th Battalion but left that to join the permanent force when the Royal Canadian Engineers were organized in 1904. While with the engineers he built the coast defense batteries at Martinique, about six miles outside of Quebec City.

At the commencement of the war he was stationed at Halifax in command of the R. C. E. there. In November, 1914, he went to Ottawa and organized the 2nd Divisional Engineers taking them to France as a lieutenant-colonel in 1915 and 1916 he organized and commanded the engineers' training depot at Shorncliffe and in the latter part of 1916 went to France in command of the Royal Engineers at the 3rd Canadian Division. There he remained until July, 1918, when he was sent back to Canada. In 1918 he received the Distinguished Service Order. On his return to this country he was appointed director of engineering services and officer administering the Royal Canadian Engineers, with station at Ottawa and held this position until his appointment as colonel commanding of this district.

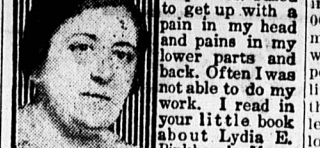

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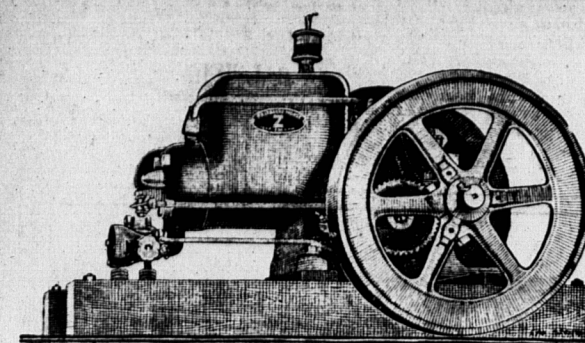

DOMINION DAY IS SUMMERSIDE'S DAY

HARD TIMES CAUSE THE SOVIETS TO ENTER INTO REAL BUSINESS

LONDON, June 22.—Because of the hard times the Soviet Ministers have decided that the nation's business is their own, says a despatch from Berlin. Enforced economy has obliged the Soviet Government to cut its department budgets in half. Consequently the bureaus are applying Lenine's battle cry "Good Communists should get into business and make money."

In line with this the Foreign Office has opened a motion picture show in Moscow. As they have a monopoly on the importation of foreign films, they have a full selection from Charlie Chaplin to world revolution propaganda. The Foreign Office also has entered the

automobile and garage business. When the members of the bureau want to use a motor car they must pay, while private parties must pay a double price.

The Ministers must pay for all goods taken from Government factories as otherwise the factories will not fill the orders. It is a common thing for two bureaus to bid against each other for the same goods. This happened recently in Petrograd in acquiring the telephone exchange system. The Ministry which offered the workers most food got the telephones.

A Clever Adaption
