GOVERNMENT CONSISTENCY.

THE HONORABLE THOMAS KICKHAM is a member of the Peter-McLean Administration. It is true that he has been shouldered out of the First District of Kings County by the pet commissioners. But he is none the less an exponent of the ideas and principles of the Government of the day.

HON. MR. KICKHAM.—I will vote in favor of the Bill and I would vote for prohibition, for I think that the working people of this country would be much benefited by the total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquor. It costs a great deal on account of the heavy duty imposed upon it. An article which costs a few cents to bear a duty of about two and a half dollars, which I think is very unfair.

"Does Total Abstinence Shorten Life." The British Medical Association recently appointed a committee for the purpose of investigating and ascertaining the average length of life attained by people who totally abstained from the use of spirituous beverages, of those who drink moderately, and also of the class who drink to an excessive degree.

First—Total abstainers, 51 1-6 years; Class II—Habitually temperate drinkers, 63 1-8 years; Class III—Careless drinkers, 59 1-2 years; Class IV—Free drinkers, 57 1-2 years; Class V—Very intemperate drinkers, 53 years.

PRINCE COUNTY EXHIBITION.

Splendid Roots and Vegetables.

A Falling off in Horses and Cattle.

A goodly number of people went up in the train to Summerside this forenoon. By the time the exhibition was opened the town was crowded. Among those who were present were the Premier and Mrs. Peters, Hon. James R. McLean, Commissioner of Public Works, Hon. J. Tappan, Hon. Peter McNutt, Hon. William Richards, Hon. J. W. Richards, Hon. George Haszard and Miss Haszard, Sheriff Hume, Archibald McNeill, Frank Boyer, John Richards, Donald McKenzie, H. C. McLeod, William Heard and others.

At twelve o'clock, Richard Hunt, Esq., on behalf of the exhibition commissioners, presented Premier Peters with an address. Hon. Mr. Peters, in a brief reply, in the course of which he expressed the opinion that if the railway authorities were to carry exhibits at lower rates than they do at present, it would greatly assist the Provincial exhibition.

Cheers were then given for the Queen and the Premier and Mrs. Peters. The show of horses is not so large as it was last year. The entries in the show are so numerous, probably owing to the early weather of the past few days. The show of cattle is also inferior to that of last year, owing, in all likelihood, to the same cause.

A great many exhibitors did not make their entries in time, and in consequence their exhibits are not eligible for prizes. The exhibits in the Drill Shed are neatly arranged, and on the whole the show is creditable. There are some very fine samples of grain, but the competition in this class is not keen. The fruit display, too, is small, some of the specimens being very good and some hardly up to the mark. The roots and vegetables on exhibition are wonderfully good. Some of the finest samples of carrots, parsnips and beets that we have seen are shown. The potatoes are good in all the varieties. Of flowers the show is small, but it is good, particularly in respect to dahlias and hydrangeas.

TELEGRAPHIC.

The Wagging Tongue.

Prohibition Convention.

TORONTO, Oct. 4. A convention of prohibitionists, representing the various temperance societies of the Province, called to consider what steps are desirable to be taken in view of a plebiscite to be taken with the municipal elections in January next assembled here yesterday.

Damage by Storm.

MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 4. The damage done by yesterday's storm will reach into millions. In the gardeners' district, across the river, dwell twenty-three families, whose homes could be seen from any eminence in this city. Only one of these homes can now be seen standing. The houses are shattered, crops ruined, and destruction appears on every hand.

A Fast Canadian Link.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4. W. C. VanHorne and R. B. Angus, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, will sail to-day from New York for Montreal. The visit of President VanHorne to Great Britain, intended to inaugurate in the Canadian line of steamships, Captain A. Hamilton Gunn, of London, who has given a good deal of attention to the scheme, is now here and will be here for some time. He is expected to be progressing favorably on the other side for Canada, and that Millford Haven would certainly be chosen as the British terminus of the line. Capt. Gunn also volunteered a statement to the effect that the Argentine Republic was coming out all right, and the Barings were about on their feet again.

Ottawa Notes.

Ottawa, Oct. 4. This term of the Supreme Court opened today. Judge King took his seat on the bench. The Chief Justice said that owing to the absence of Judge Gwynne, and on account of Judge Sedgwick having been interested in preparing the Manitoba School case, that case could not be proceeded with to-day. It was said last night that Judge Gwynne is better and will probably be in court to-morrow. The Dominion Immigration Agent Crosser telegraphed to the Interior Department today that he is taking 18 delegates from Michigan to the Northwest. Captains S. Cox and Uehlfart, British Columbia sealers, were here today on their way to the coal country. They had an interview with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and left for New York.

Presbyterian Synod.

TURGO, Oct. 4. The Presbyterian Synod was organized last evening by Divine Service and a sermon by Rev. Dr. Murray, of North Sydney. The roll call showed a large attendance of delegates. The decreased clergy members of last year's synod are Rev. Messrs. Farquharson, and McQuarrie, of Sydney Presbytery; Rev. Dr. Blair, of Pictou Presbytery; and Rev. Allan McLean, of St. John's Presbytery. Rev. Dr. Murray, in his closing address, referred to the changes in the Synod during the 44 years of his ministry and read a letter from Rev. Dr. McCulloch, which was a benediction upon the Synod by that patriarch of 56 years in the ministry of the Church. On motion of Rev. Mr. Morrison, seconded by Rev. Alexander Falconer, Rev. Allan Simpson was unanimously elected Moderator. On taking the chair, he gave an exceedingly well received address.
