THERE is a rumor afloat in Ottawa that C. J. Brydges has been appointed General Manager of the Canada Pacific, and Mr. Vanborn will look after the construction department.

THE Glasgow papers announce the new Cunard liner "Aurania," a vessel of 7,500 tons, built of steel, as large as the "Servia," and broader than usual in proportion to her length.

CAPTAIN MICHAEL WILSON, who it will be remembered, was accidentally shot in Mr. Wm. Robertson's hardware store, Halifax, some three weeks since, by one of the clerks named Wills, died on Thursday morning last. Wills has been arrested.

REV. J. C. BERRIE on Wednesday last, lectured at Salisbury Road, a short distance from Moncton, on "London: Work and Play." The lecture is well spoken of. At the close the Rev. gentleman was presented with a complimentary address, accompanied by a handsome sum of money.

COUNCILLOR CHAPPELLE'S resolution submitted at the meeting of the City Council, on Monday last, reducing the salary of Mayor to five dollars, did not, in any way, apply to the present incumbent, but was intended to govern future officials. The resolution stated that "on and after the 24th January instant, the change be made."

We regret to learn that Mrs. George Matthews met with a very serious accident yesterday. While on her way to visit some friends on St. Peter's Road she was attacked by a ferocious cow, which gored her horribly. Mrs. Matthews was taken to her home, and Dr. Beer was called in attendance. The extent of the injuries received are, as yet, unknown, but it is hoped they are not so serious as reported.

At two o'clock this morning an attempt was made to steal a horse, from the stable of Mr. Matthew Stevenson, on Richmond street. Mr. Albert Stevenson, on hearing a noise in the stable went in and discovered the thief crouched down behind the horse in the stall. He called for assistance, but before receiving it the thief dashed passed him out of the stable, and shortly became concealed in some of the neighboring yards. He left a stick behind him, however, which may serve to identify him.

An experiment has been tried by a gentleman on Pownall Street, which has proved unsuccessful. It was that of manufacturing ice in packing cases. His intention was to fill the cases with water, leave them out until frozen solid, then take the blocks of ice out and place them in his ice house. This, however, proved a failure, when the water froze the cases burst asunder, so he found it was no use continuing the business, and concluded that the old way was the best.—Com.

Two countrymen who started for Tracadie yesterday, accompanied by "John Jamieson," came to grief. They became intoxicated shortly after leaving the city, and one named McDonald left the sleigh to walk home. Late at night Mr. Casey, of Binnstead, was attracted to a grove near his residence by the barking of his dog. On following the dog into the woods he discovered McDonald lying apparently asleep with his arms frozen to the elms, and otherwise seriously injured from cold and exposure. Mr. Casey had him removed to his residence where McDonald was revived and thence taken to the city for medical treatment. What became of his companion is not known.

MOVEMENTS OF THE FISHING FLEET AND FISH RECEIPTS.—The winter Georges fleet are meeting with good success, several large fares ranging from 20,000 to 30,000 lbs, codfish having been received since our last issue. The whole number of Georges arrivals for the week has been ten, and the receipts 219,000 codfish and 20,000 lbs. halibut, which is a good showing at this season. The net codfishing receipts are falling off, the amount landed the past week being 147,000 lbs. making the total receipts for codfish 336,000 lbs. Other fish receipts for the week, 300 qts hake, 300 qts codfish and 150,000 frozen herring. For the corresponding week of last year the receipts were 98,000 lbs. codfish, 87,800 lbs. halibut, 12,000 lbs. haddock and 150,000 frozen herring. Last week the receipts were 250,200 lbs. codfish, 4000 lbs. haddock and 4200 lbs. Georges halibut.—Cape Ann Advertiser.

The Princess

OTTAWA, Jan. 10. It is stated on good authority that Princess Louise will spend the winter in Charleston, Carolina.

Steamer Burned—Crew Missing.

LONDON, Jan. 10. The ship "British Empire," 1,499 tons, owned in London, on passage from Shields to Bombay, was burned at sea. Two boats, the captain and fourteen of the crew are missing.

Destructive Floods.

LONDON, Jan. 10. Floods in Hungary are increasing. The town of Raab has been submerged, and many lives have been lost. Water in the Rhine has been falling.

Professor Palmer's Murderer.

LONDON, Jan. 10. Evidence taken at the trial of Professor Palmer's murder shows that the Professor and his party were murdered by order of the Governor of Napoli. The Governor has been arrested.

The Cavendish-Barke Murder—Another Confession.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. Hugh O'Donnely, New York, made a confession before a Magistrate on the 22nd of November last, of having participated in the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke in Phoenix Park, Dublin. He says that he in company with Peter Tierney, James McDonald and another, committed the crime. It was the result of a Fenian plot. After the murder he came to New York on the 22nd of May. While here he has seen the other assassins—Tierney and McDonald—several times. O'Donnely has been imprisoned.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR. IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to Incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councillor in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILLORS, will be held on

WEDNESDAY, the 24th Day of January, A. D. 1883, At the several places, that is to say: In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearty's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets. And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS. Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground. Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town. NOMINATION DAY. Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—"Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates." There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid. The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
