CONTRACT BRIDGE

BIDDING A QUESTIONABLE SLAM

IF PARTNERS insist on being a little optimistic in slam-bidding, it behooves them to "pick their spots." Suppose, for example, that they are all alone in the auction—that at no time have the opponents displayed a disposition to compete. In that case the slam should be approached with discretion and diffidence, because if it can't be made, nothing can save the bidders from their own exuberance.

If, however, the opponents are also doing a lot of bidding it may be the height of wisdom to bid a doubtful slam—simply because the enemy, not knowing that it is doubtful, may indulge in desperate sacrificing. Here is a case in point:

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. East-West 40 on score.

South's leap to five diamonds and North's six-diamond bid were about equally optimistic. North had already made a free bid of clubs at the three-level, and South's diamond jump strongly implied that North's length there would not be nearly as valuable as other material he might have held.

However, the fate of the six-diamond contract was no longer an issue inasmuch as West decided to "sacrifice." Certainly, this was a highly dubious decision—unless West took it for granted that anything the opponents bid, they could make.

North—defending against six spades doubled, opened his fourth-highest diamond. South won and returned the club five Declarer (West) ducked, and North won the queen. Now, giving declarer no chance to establish hearts and discard a club, North underled the heart ace. South put up the king and led another club, and thus the quite needless sacrifice contract was defeated four tricks, 700 points.

It is plain to be seen that South would have gone down at six diamonds.
