S'side Town Council To Purchase Office Machines

With Mayor Currie and all councillors present, the Summerside Town Council last night held its regular monthly meeting in the town building.

Councillor MacCausland moved a resolution that the town purchase and electrical calculating machine with typewriter keys from the National Cash Register Company at a price of \$7,085.00 and also an addressograph machine from the Addressograph Multi-graph Company at a price of \$5,168.38. Councillor MacCausland pointed out that the time has come to make these purchases which the town auditors have recommended in their yearly reports.

He also said that if the machines were not purchased the town would be faced with the necessity of hiring additional help in the Town Clerk's office. The fact that the purchase of these machines will enable the Town Clerk to have a system that will save the town several thousands of dollars yearly in bank overdraft interest alone, will facilitate billings for all town departments without loss of time was taken into consideration by the council members.

Mayor Currie said that the machines would have far reaching savings and it would be difficult

to enumerate its numerous benefits. The matter of this purchase, he said, had been under advisement for some months and given full consideration.

On motion it was decided by the meeting to purchase the machines. **ELECTRIC LIGHT CALLS**

Reporting for the Electric Light Department, Councillor Clark said that the linesmen of the department receive many calls from householders to make repairs when there is a power failure in the home and that in many cases it is just a matter of a burned out fuse that had caused the trouble. He said that when the trouble was caused by such reasons that the calls would be charged to the householder.

The Town Manager pointed out that the town contracts to bring power only as far as the meter and that no employee of the town should under any circumstances be expected to go beyond the meter to ascertain any electrical trouble in a household.

Councillor Newson reporting for his committee said that the work at the Civic Auditorium had been completed on the grounds adjoining the building, that the floor in the stadium had been repaired and the stadium painted and that it was in readiness for the Lobster Carnival.

He said that a citizen of the town was interested in purchasing the MacInnis property at the west end of the town and that since the town had no use for the house that it take under consideration the selling of it.

It was decided that the property be advertised to the public as being for sale.

Councillor Newson said that the town patrol is showing a greater amount of mileage than he felt was justified.

In reply Councillor Jenkins said that the Police Department receive many calls to attend to that the general public is not aware of. **REFERS TO COMPLAINTS**

Speaking of complaints received that the patrol car is being used outside its proper jurisdiction, he said he had investigated that matter and felt that the patrol wagon

had not been driven outside the town boundaries.

Councillor Newson said that he knew of two occasions when the patrol had been seen on Linkletter Road and this was in his opinion not in its territory.

Councillor Jenkins said that he would investigate the matter further regarding this point and report back at a later meeting.

Much discussion was given to the matter of an accident which happened to the patrol wagon at the corner of Spring and Fitzroy Streets at some time in the past. According to the report handed in by Officer MacKinnon, who had been driving the patrol at the time, the underpart of the car had been damaged by coming in contact with a manhole cover at that point. The officer's report claimed also that the underpart of the car had been damaged on previous occasions when it had been in contact with driveways and curbs.

Councillor Jenkins said he did not think that the patrol car was at all suitable in the first place as it did not have sufficient road clearance.

Councillor MacCausland said that in his opinion the officer concerned should be demoted or demoted because the accident at the time it happened.

The meeting discussed the advisability of a trade in for the present patrol car for a suitable panel delivery model.

Town Manager Joseph Brophy pointed out that since the patrol car was a late model job the trade in value would be high and the exchange could be made with very little expense to the town. He said he felt that a proper police patrol would be more suitable in many ways than the present car used by the Police Department.

TRUCK PURCHASE

The matter of the purchase of two light delivery trucks, one for the Light Department and one for the Water and Sewerage Department was brought up by Councillor Jenkins who said that he had been severely criticized by several car dealers in town who said they had not been given the opportunity to submit tenders on the purchase.

It was decided to join the Maritime Firemen's Association and a cheque for \$10 for registration fees is being forwarded

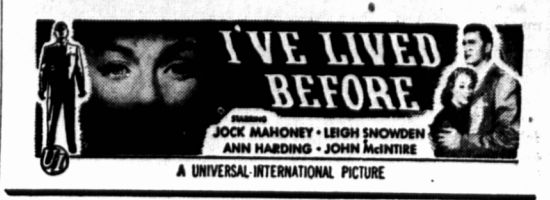
DICTATOR CELEBRATES

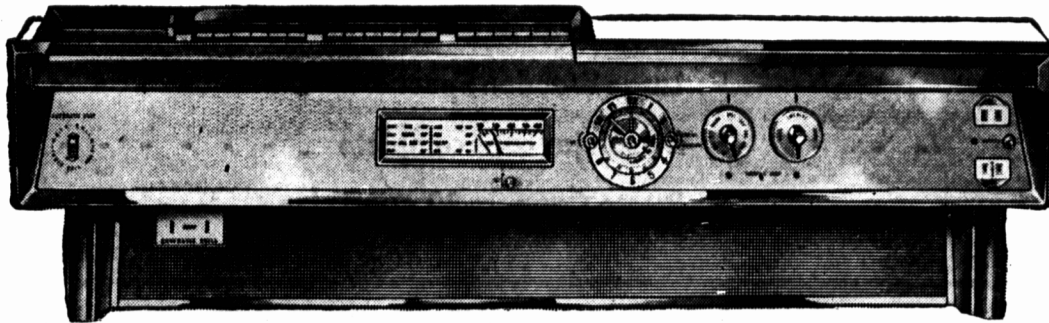

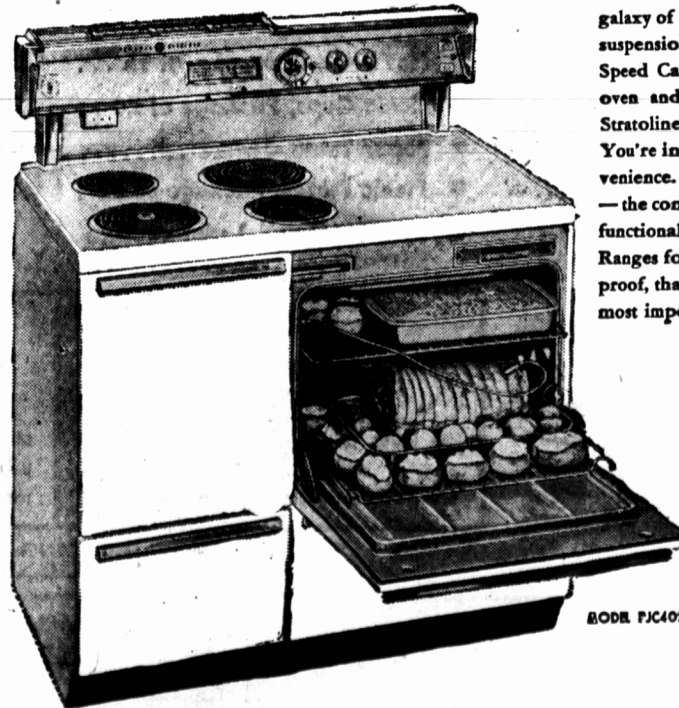
