THIS AGRICULTURAL INDUSTRY

MATHESON Provincial Farm Editor A "dairy policy statement" by Agriculture Minister Harry Hays suggests at the outset that some farmers are not still fully aware as to just how the new dairy policy affects them, and frankly I don't blame the ones that are confused. I've read the explanation carefully and I can't say that I'm entirely free from confusion myself. How about this statement, for example: "The objective is a national average return of \$3.50 per hundredweight for manufacturing milk consumed in Canada. I would like to emphasize that this is not a guarantee to every producer but to the industry as a whole. It does not mean that every

shipper will receive exactly \$3.50. The farmer's total return will still depend on how well he does in negotiating the price he gets at the plant." Then the Ottawa release that the national average of \$3.50 will be reached through two direct but separate payments from the government to the producers... The first will be made during the dairy year, and will start in a couple of months or so, the second will be made after the dairy year ends. "The first cheque farmers will receive will be a supplementary payment based on their deliveries during the last dairy year. To qualify they must have delivered at least 10,000 pounds", it is explained. Forms have been mailed to producers, or they may be in the process of mailing to others. The important thing is that these forms be returned. The forms should be sent back as soon as possible. Supplementary payments cannot be made until the forms are completed and returned. And that is the really important part of the whole announcement. This "supplementary payment" as they call it, will be made at the rate of 25 cents per hundredweight for the first 48,000 pounds delivered in the last dairy year. It's 20 cents per hundredweight on the next 48,000 pounds and 10 cents per hundredweight on all eligible manufacturing milk over 96,000 pounds. The announcement explains that some producers will receive more and some others less than the national average, which it suggests is 29 cents per hundred pounds on a national basis.

Fourteen litter-mate pairs of Yorkshire barrows were closely matched for initial liveweight (121 lb average) and put into individual, concrete-floored pens. One pig of each pair, designated the "single-feeder", was hand-fed once daily the maximum quantity of feed with water it could voluntarily consume within 30 minutes. Its partner, the "multiple-feeder" received the same total amount of feed and water divided into five equal meals daily. Feed consumption averaged 5 1/2 lb per pig daily during the 8-week experimental feeding period.

Although both groups of pigs had the same average carcass weight (158 lb) at slaughter, there were large differences in carcass quality. The depth of shoulder fat was 13 per cent less and the loin eye area of lean was four per cent more in the "single-feeders" than in their more frequently fed partners. The minimum depth of backfat overlying the loin eye muscle was 12 per cent less for the pigs fed once daily. Chemical analysis of carcass sides, also showed that the fat content of the carcasses from the "single-feeders" was 34.2 per cent compared with 35.7 per cent for the "multiple-feeders". However Dr. D.W. Friend, who has been in charge of the Nappan experiment, cautions that the application of the feeding experiment to grouped pigs, and to other environmental conditions have still to be studied.

Thus far, apparently, it is an interesting experiment, with pigs that are fed as individuals. How it will work in practical every-day experience may be something entirely different.

Senator Molson Sees Brewing Tax Too High

MONTREAL (CP) - Canadian business wanting to compete in the United States must be prepared to find many obstacles in its path, Senator Hartland deM. Molson, president of Molson Breweries Ltd., said at the company's annual meeting Monday. Senator Molson told shareholders that although Canadians were fond of Americans as individuals and admired them as a people, "we are being naive if we believe that friendship carries through into the marketplace."

The senator said the Canadian brewing industry continues to bear a heavier tax burden than that of industry in general. He added: "The emergency tax imposed on the breweries at the time of the Korean war is still included in the tax structure and our industry is the only one still paying the special taxes stemming from this war." "Now more than ever, when the brewing industry is apparently not keeping pace with the economy, we think this burden is an unfair impediment to the growth of our industry and is unhealthy to the economy as a whole."
