A VALUABLE CARGO.—We learn from the Summerside Journal that the brig, Hattie Louise, Capt. Bernard, is ready for sea, and sails with the first favorable wind for the British West Indies. She carries the following cargo: 2000 sacks white oats, 500 barrels potatoes, 100 bales hay, and 19 cases canned lobsters under deck; on deck, 20 horses, 60 sheep, 150 geese, with feed, etc. The total value of the cargo is about \$7,000.

SOME RECENT SHIPMENTS.—The Summerside Pioneer says:—Messrs. Avar and Drummond shipped 400 sheep on Monday, and on Tuesday the same gentlemen sent over 12 fine ewes for breeding purposes to Mr. McFadyen, conductor on the I. C. R., and ten head of cattle to St. John. Four horses were also sent over by various parties. Again on Wednesday morning James Kane shipped 172 sheep, and J. O'Brien 245 and 8 cattle, all for the St. John market. Mr. George B. McKay sent over a fine filly by French Barrister last Thursday morning to Amherst. This fine animal, which weighed 1445 lbs., was for Mr. Holmes of that town.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Railway Facilities.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13. Sir Donald Smith, Mr. YanHorne and Mr. Shaughnessy were heard to-day before a sub-committee of the Privy Council in reference to their requests as to increased facilities over the Intercolonial, between St. John and Halifax. The sub-committee, which consists of the Premier, Sir Hector Langevin, Sir John Thompson, Hon. Mr. Foster, Hon. Mr. Chapleau and Hon. Mr. Haggart are, it is understood, charged with the consideration of the whole question of the proposed fasttrans-continental mail service and other questions connected with it.

Halifax Notes.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 14. The Provincial Normal School opened to-day with an unusually large attendance of students.

A cablegram from London announces the sudden death of Col. Andrew R. McKinlay, of A. & W. McKinlay, wholesale stationers, aged 53. He sailed for London two weeks ago.

The German steamer Wandrahn arrived to-day with 12,000 bags of beet sugar.

Baptist Congress.

TORONTO, Nov. 13. The eighth annual meeting of the Baptist Congress of America opened here yesterday. The attendance of delegates from the United States is not as large as expected. The subjects for discussion were organization for christian work other than the church and natural and artificial monopolies. The latter subject brought out three straight advocates of Henry George's theory and two opponents.

British Vessel Seized.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 13. Steamship St. Roma, from Carthagena, reports the British schooner Pearl, of Nova Scotia, was seized by the Colombian steamer Lapopa for trading on the San Blas coast, and taken to Carthagena. This is the first seizure ever made on the coast under the Act of 50 years' standing making the coast of Colombia dutiable to all foreign vessels engaged in coasting.

University Dedicated.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. The Catholic university was dedicated to-day. Much of the programme was omitted because of the inclement weather. Only that part designed to occur indoors was carried out.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. Attorneys for both sides in the \$300,000 suit brought by Sir Bache Cunard against Charles G. Franklyn some time ago, appeared in court to-day and announced that a settlement had been agreed upon.
