

600 Curlers From Canada And U.S. Entered In Bonspiel

QUEBEC (CP)—More than 600 curlers from Canada and the United States moved into action Monday in the 43rd annual Quebec International bonspiel. A record total of 128 rinks are bidding for the 14 trophies at stake in the week-long bonspiel, one of the most colorful in North America. The main prize at stake is the Lieutenant-Governors' Trophy, won last year by Gaston Amyot. Quebec Jacques Cartier rink, Amyot got his squad off to a fast start Monday with an easy 10-2 victory over a rink from the Royal Canadian Club, Toronto, skipped by Nelson Findlay. The bonspiel was officially opened at a civic reception Sunday night. All rinks which have entered the bonspiel—including many from the Maritimes—will have at least one game a day, even if they lose every one. For the women there is a private competition with the Patterson Trophy as first prize. At least 50 women are taking part in this contest.

Playwright A. A. Milne Dies At 74

HARTFIELD, England (AP)—A. A. Milne, playwright, novelist, essayist and writer of light verse, died Tuesday night at his Sussex home. He was 74. A man of gentle wit, Milne created possibly his greatest success with two children's books, "Winnie-the-Pooh" and "The House at Pooh Corner." Born of Scots parentage he was educated at Westminster and at Trinity College, Cambridge. From 1906 to 1914 he was on the staff of Punch, the humor magazine. His first successful play was "Mr. Pim Passes Away," produced in 1920. It was quickly followed by "The Romantic Age," "The Truth About Blavatsky," "The Dover Road" and many others. In the frequently revived "Toad of Toad Hall," Milne made a graceful adaptation for the stage of Kenneth Grahame's "The Wind in the Willows."

TORONTO (CP)—Israeli composer Ernest Bloch, who celebrated his 75th birthday last July, will be honored Feb. 15 by a CBC concert of his music, it was announced Tuesday.

Starting at 10 p. m. AST, it will be part of the Trans-Canada network program "Wednesday night" and the Montreal Symphony Orchestra will be conducted by Alexander Broff.

The program results from a suggestion to the CBC by the Canadian Jewish Congress that some form of recognition be given Mr. Bloch's birthday. He lives in the United States.

Wanted: Can. Hockey Players Who Have Pucks, Will Travel

Canadian Press Staff Writers: CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP)—Wanted: Canadian amateur hockey players interested in playing for European country in 1960 Olympics. Good working conditions. Wonderful scenery. Write giving experience, referees and attitude toward bodychecking behind the blue line. The advertisement hasn't appeared in the papers yet. But under the regulations there's nothing to prevent it. J. F. (Bunny) Ahearne, European president of the International Ice Hockey Federation, explained Tuesday the Olympic rule, passed in 1953, that made it possible for Italy to include six Canadian-trained players on its team in this year's tournament. "We had been having a lot of difficulty over birth certificate qualifications of players," Elirop's Mr. Hockey said in an interview. "So we amended the constitution to read that any player holding a passport for the country he is representing in the world championships or Olympics will be considered a national of that country and therefore eligible to play." The Italians were the first to spot the possibilities of the amendment. They quickly mailed passports to six Canadian residents of Italian extraction—defenceman Carlo Montemurro, 22, of Rouyn, Que., and Carmine Tucci, 21, of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., and forwards Bernardo Tomei, 20, and Aldo Maniaco, 21, of Sault Ste. Marie. Giovanni Furlani, 19, of Sudbury and Remo Alberton, 19, of Niagara Falls, Ont. FARED WELL ON ICE The six, whose Canadian hockey experience ranged up to intermediate, got a prominent share of the goals—and penalties—in Italy's unsuccessful campaign for the world title. And there was word last week that the idea was beginning to spread. Bruno Hoffel, coach of the Austrian team which took a 2-0 pasting from Kitchener Waterloo Dutchmen, indicated his country is interested in getting in touch with a high-calibre young Canadian who might be interested in getting a higher education in Austria in exchange for his hockey-playing ability. Ahearne hastened to point out further international regulations restricting a wholesale exodus of Canadian puckchasers. In the first place, no members of the current Kitchener-Waterloo team, the 1955 Peabody V's or the 1954 Toronto Granites need apply. They are barred by the rule stating that no player on a national team in a world hockey tournament may ever represent another country.
