Report N.B. Potatoes Moving To Ontario And Quebec Markets

HARTLAND, N.B. — A gradual increase in movement of the early potato variety, the Irish Cobbler in Carleton County has been noted during the past week, and it is reported that a carload a day has been shipped to the Quebec-Ontario market. These potatoes are now selling on both markets on a competitive basis. Digging of the early variety is well along now, with a steady flow to the markets. The cobbler crop has been rated as of good quality with an approximate yield of 100 barrels an acre. The price outlook now appears brighter, but it is reported the price per barrel varies somewhat from dealer to dealer. As no outstanding shipments have been made, an average price is difficult to figure.

While the local fluctuates from day to day, more concern by growers and shippers is now being placed on the latter and main crop, following announcement of the reopening of the Argentine market, which has been closed for three years for certified seed potatoes from this area.

Competition In securing the South American contract, N. B. growers and shippers must compete with P.E.I. and Maine. The bulk of Argentine shipments includes Katahdins.

Island Cadet Returns From Training Camp

Good Major Jimmie MacQuarrie of the Queen Square School Cadet Corps, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hector MacQuarrie, Charlottetown, returned home from Banff, Alberta, last week after undergoing a three week training program in the westernmost of the Prairie Provinces.

MacQuarrie, who was the only Island cadet attending the camp, was one of the 156 boys from across the Dominion who were selected to undergo special training.

Selection for the camp, known as the Master Cadet Camp, came as a reward for outstanding ability in cadet work and it is highly honored that it can be won in the cadet corps. The camp is regarded as a model camp for the remainder of the Dominion. Jimmie, along with the rest of the cadets, spent three weeks in the Banff area. Prior to that he spent ten days training at Aldershot in company with fifteen other cadets from the Maritimes.

At Banff the boys spent one week in training on the grounds, another living in the woods and the third on a tour of interesting places in the West. Among the places the boys visited were the famous summer resort Lake Louise, the Radium Hot Springs in British Columbia and the Upper Hot Springs in Alberta.

The boys were guests of honor on several occasions at the Banff Springs Hotel. This was one of the highlights of the trip as the cadets were given royal treatment by the hotel management and the guests.

Another highlight of the camp was the inspection of the cadets by Major-General Vokes from the Western Command Headquarters. While at Banff, Jimmie met a former Islander, named Mr. Crosby. He left the Island 40 years ago.

ernment offer financial assistance. However, the greater majority of the people of the area must want electricity before it was feasible to place it there, since there must of necessity be a proportionate return from that area. He was not prepared at this time, he said, to announce the details of the program, since they were not complete, but the full program and details would be announced in the near future.

He also spoke on the road policy program that a general overall program was being set up. However, it was necessary, in view of the high cost of road construction, although lower than several years ago, to maintain a balance so that the Province need not borrow. All things must be considered in the Province, and being an agricultural and fishing province, it was his opinion that production must be increased to a satisfactory available market.

Through connections at Wood Island, Southern King's and Nova Scotia for the same time other markets must be further developed. Advance in the economy of the province, both in agriculture and in fishing, would be a major step forward in the development of the Province as a whole.

Importance Of Spray Program Emphasized

It is too early to ascertain whether or not the severe rain storm of last Saturday will greatly increase the amount of potato late blight. The weekly potato bulletin of the Science Service Laboratory: Some fields where infections were known to exist were examined on Monday and it was found that the fungus was producing spores. The potential for disease spread is, therefore, present in the fields. This danger, coupled with the heavy growth of vines, suggests that the spray program should not be neglected.

Aphids are becoming more numerous in many fields and some damage by feeding has been noted. The spread of leafroll and mosaic is caused by these aphids which is usually more important than the damage caused by feeding. It is necessary to include DDT 25% emulsion, 1 quart to 100 gallons, in all the regular sprays to control these aphids as well as other insects.
