Jaycees Request Public Co-operation In Their Safety Week Program

Next week has been proclaimed Highway and Traffic Safety Week throughout Prince Edward Island and the co-operation of all citizens is requested. The week, which is being sponsored by the Charlottetown Junior Chamber of Commerce, is held in co-operation with the Department of Public Works and Highways, the R. C. M. P. and the Charlottetown Police. An extensive publicity programme will be carried out with the object being to have people accident and safety conscious when driving or walking or in any way using our public streets and highways.

The R.C.M.P. are launching their car check on Monday to tie in with the safety programme and will be checking traffic coming into the city. The City Police are holding

their car check in conjunction with the R.C.M.P. and everyone in this area should be sporting a "sticker" by the end of the week.

On Monday there will be a formal opening of "Safety Week" by civic and club officials. This opening will take place near the city scale house at 12 o'clock noon. Over one hundred "Safety Week" posters have been printed and these will be placed on posts at the main intersections through Charlottetown and also at the approaches to the city.

Today newspapers are carrying page ads which are designed to launch the "Safety Week" programme.

Equipment For Farm Drainage Ready Shortly

Numerous applications from all parts of the Province have been received for the service of the two government ditch diggers which will be in operation shortly for farm drainage and clearance purposes, Hon Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Resources, stated yesterday.

The equipment which the Department is procuring comprises two tractors with bulldozers and winches. It was expected to be available this month, and one of the tractors has arrived, but without the ditcher. Delivery has been promised by the first of June.

In the meantime, the Department is working out a policy under which operations can be completed in one locality before the equipment is moved to another section. The Minister said he could not state at this stage just where the work would begin.

Figures Show Cobblers Still In Most Demand

"Seed potato shipments to May 15 total 4,811,000 bushels as against 4,269,000 shipped from the 1948 crop," reports Mr. S.G. Peppin, Chief Inspector in charge of Seed Potato Certification. "It would now appear possible that seed shipments from this 1949 crop will reach an all time high of five million bushels."

Of particular interest to Island growers and dealers, Mr. Peppin states is the ratio of seed shipments by varieties, which shows that the Irish Cobbler still leads in popularity:

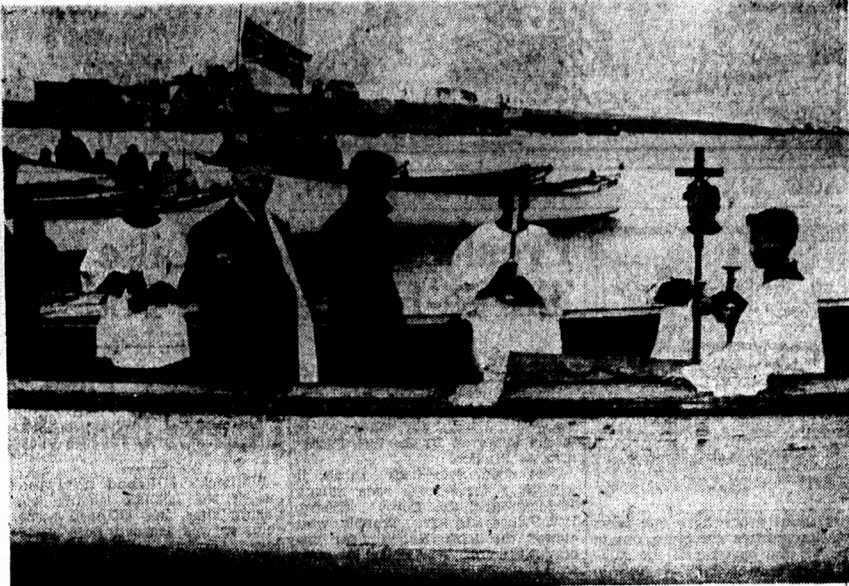

York Players Win Drama Festival Playoff

The York Players were the winners of the Queen's County play-offs held in North River Hall last evening, with their production of "She Married Well".

Stating that the three plays of the evening were the most difficult to judge to date, Mrs. J.P. Millar, gave her usual very thorough adjudication, after awarding the first place to York.

Best female performance of the evening was awarded to Margery Smith for her outstanding characterization of Mrs. Slater in the Hunter River Players' production of "The Dear Departed". First place for male performance was given to Dewar Swan for his strong portrayal of Ned Bradford in the York play.

In her adjudication, Mrs. Millar told the casts that to make a good play the entire cast must be uniformly strong, and that the director is the "coach of the team" and must make all decisions pertaining to production. She suggested that the casts move whenever possible on their own speeches, and that they endeavor to keep their faces toward the audience when speaking, in order that expressions might be visible.

Director Commended

Mr. Arthur Vessey, director of the winning play, was commended very highly on his work in presenting the play, and Ralph Crockett was congratulated on his superb pantomime in the role of James Potter.

Phoebe MacKinnon who directed, and also played the role of Effie Palge in the Clyde River production of "Even Exchange", was congratulated on her excellent speaking voice. Though pitched in the lower register, it was audible at all times.

In adjudicating the Hunter River play, Mrs. Millar said that it was the inner conviction, vitality, and drive of Margery Smith which won first place for her as best female performer of the evening. This play was picked as a very close second, and it was the lack of tempo in the latter part of the performance which pulled the

Splendid Progress In City Red Shield Canvass

City canvassers in the Salvation Army financial campaign rolled up an impressive \$6,100, it was announced at the final supper meeting of workers in the Army Citadel last evening. The provincial objective is \$9,500.

Mr. N. D. MacLean, who, along with Mr. J. C. Montgomery was co-chairman of the Charlottetown drive, presided at the meeting and thanked the workers for their co-operation in making the campaign a success.

The Provincial Chairman, Mr. T. Roy Cudmore, spoke briefly commending the volunteer workers for "a job well done." He stated that local Army Headquarters here had received a telegram from Toronto urging that every possible step be taken to assure the provincial quota be reached, and it possible to exceed that amount. The floods in Manitoba had placed a strain on the resources of the Army.

The Grace Hospital in Winnipeg had been evacuated and mothers and babies transferred to the Salvation Army Hospitals in Regina, Saskatoon and Calgary.

The Salvation Army is operating emergency centres in Toronto for the sorting and forwarding of relief parcels to the stricken area and the Commissioner appeals to all campaign workers across Canada to put forth an extra effort to exceed last year's amount.

Mr. Cudmore announced that any amount received over the objective set here would be used for Manitoba flood relief purposes. It has been decided to organize a house to house canvass of the city so that those who might have been missed in the general canvass will be able to assist in this worthy cause.

The response from the Women's Institutes is increasing and the Provincial chairman urgently appealed to those who have not, as yet, written to the local headquarters, to come to the aid of this great need as soon as possible.

Brief remarks on the campaign were made by Mr. Darrell MacGuire, publicity chairman, Mr. Gordon Avar, Special Names Division, and Major E. Hutchinson. No 5 Division, Canadian National Railways topped the divisional competition having turned in 168 per cent of its objective. Co-commanders were T. M. Beahm and Eldon Campbell. The team prize was won by team no 25 captained by Hal Moore. It had 342 per cent of its objective.

The chairman appealed to the workers to clean-up any outstanding cards and to make returns as quickly as possible.
