Every town in Prince Edward Island, has its main street, Charlottetown, Summerside, Montserrat, Souris and the villages in between. But next week when the Provincial Exhibition gets underway the Charlottetown driving park becomes the main street of the Island, and holds this distinction throughout the week. From east and west from north and south, will come the business and professional men of many communities; the farmers, the fishermen, and also the youth and beauty of the Province.

## Will Try To Complete West River Crossing This Year

"Every effort will be made to bring the construction of the West River causeway and bridge to a conclusion this year," said Hon. J. George MacKay, Minister of Highways yesterday. At the present time steel sheet piling which will enclose the concrete abutments for the bridge opening is being erected. In the TOP picture can be seen an over all scene of the project showing a short portion of fill still to be placed. LEFT a workman threads one of the steel piling into place while a crane steadies it into position. After the abutments have been placed an opening 15 feet below low water will be excavated and the present opening in the embankment will be closed.

When the crossing of the West River was first started in 1955, it was intended that a bridge structure set on wooden piles would be built. However it was found that the bottom of the river was of such material that piles of sufficient length could not be used. It became necessary therefore to abandon the idea of a full scale bridge and fill in the present channel with shale. The proposed bridge opening which will allow for river traffic will have a 60 foot single span of steel and concrete. The surface of the roadway which is 1,900 feet from shore to shore will be hard surfaced 24 feet wide with a five foot sidewalk on the bridge.

## Advances In Wheat Talks

SASKATOON (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Friday continuous negotiations and discussions are going on between Canada and the United States concerning effects of U.S. giveaways on Canada's export wheat business. "Definite advances" have been made in talks on the farm produce export problem, the prime minister told reporters in an interview at the airport here. He stopped in Saskatoon en route from Ottawa to Prince Albert. "U.S. officialdom," Mr. Diefenbaker said, "has shown a realization of the effects on Canada of the U.S. agricultural disposal program. In other words, the prime minister said "one of the very good things was the joint American - Canadian defence which came into effect last week, whereby each of us recognizes the other as an equal partner by the appointment of a Canadian as second-in-command in connection with continental defence."

"In the past, we didn't have that equality of official responsibility that now has been achieved therefore bringing this into line with the course followed by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Europe."

**SENTENCE JUVENILES**

NEW YORK (AP) — Eight teen-agers arrested after the stabbing of two boys July 30 were sent to reform schools Thursday. Nine others involved in the attack face murder charges Aug. 20. The commitment orders were given after a hearing in children's court. Michael Farmer, 15-year-old polio-handicapped son of a city fireman, was stabbed fatally in a park attack. A friend, Roger McShane, 16, suffered serious stab wounds in the same attack.

## Shipments By Rail In July

An unusually large shipment of potatoes last month accounted for all of the increase of exports over imports, the report of the C.N.R. for July indicates. There were 140 carloads shipped out of the province via Borden as compared with only 44 carloads in July a year ago. The four cars of Irish moss was double the amount shipped a year ago.

There were 21 carloads of railway material exported last month compared to seven in July of last year. In all other categories the exports were less than those of the same month a year ago. 97 cars of livestock were exported, two less than for July 1956. There were twelve cars of meats, also two less than last July. The biggest drop in exports was noted in rough wood with 14 carloads going out last month compared to 60 carloads in July a year ago.

Total exports amounted to 406 carloads compared to 377 carloads in July 1956. Imports to the province show a sharp drop from the imports of the same month a year ago. 1190 carloads came into the province via Borden compared with 1516 carloads a year ago. The biggest decrease in imports was in sand and gravel with 124 cars coming in last month compared to 375 in July 1956. Gas and oil also fell off sharply with only seventy cars last month. There were 130 in July last year. There were 98 cars of flour and feed in 1957 last year. The 49 cars of coal was a sharp drop from the 136 cars a year ago. Automobile imports also dropped by 14 carloads to 38 carloads last month. Increased imports were represented.

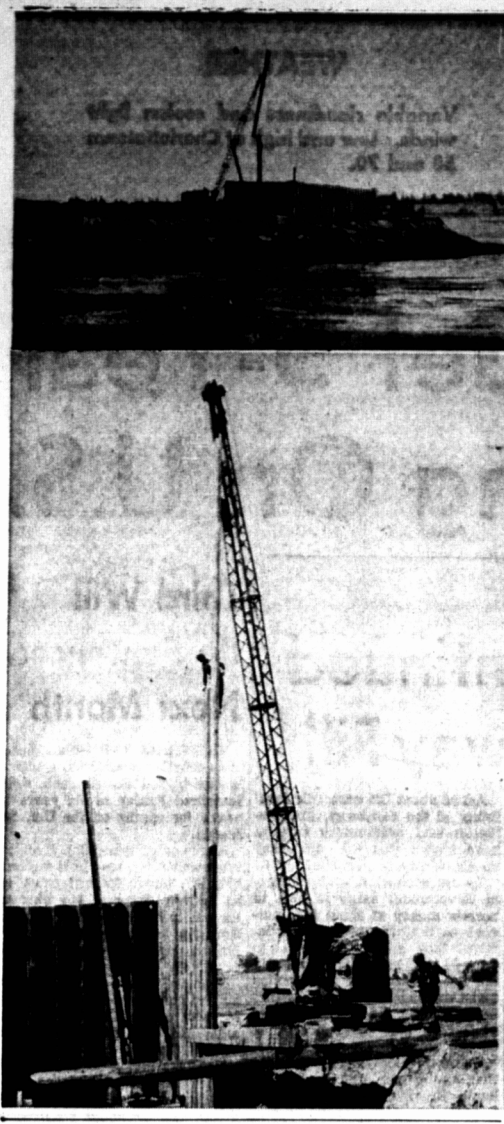

## Calls On Local Liberals To Resign And Call Election

Speaking at the annual meeting of the 3rd District, Queens County held last night in Mt. Stewart, R.R. Bell called on the local Liberal Government to resign, and to allow the voters of P.E.I. to show how they feel towards the party that has led this province into such serious financial difficulties. Mr. Bell stated that although he has resigned as Provincial Leader of the Conservative Party he is not through with politics, and that he will continue to work until the Conservatives have been elected on P.E.I. as well as in Ottawa.

Mr. Bell spoke of his trip to Great Britain, and of seeing butter and cheese from New Zealand, fruits and wines from South Africa, and meats from Australia on sale there, but no agricultural products from Canada. He praised Prime Minister Diefenbaker's efforts whilst at the Commonwealth Conference, and was sure that his policies will improve agricultural conditions on P.E.I.

Mr. Andrew McRae and Mr. Russell Driscoll thanked the members for their work in the last local election and praised their enthusiasm being shown throughout the district. Health Macquarrie, M.P. for Queens County, addressed the meeting, thanking the workers for their support and urging them to even greater efforts in order to displace the local Liberal Government in the near future. W.R. Shaw told of the Agricultural conference just held at St. Dunstan's, and of the problems facing the farmers of this province, caught between rising costs for what they must buy and falling prices for what they can sell. He told of the new spirit of enthusiasm sweeping through all the Government departments in Ottawa, bringing a freshness and new viewpoint into stale corners. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Dan Birt, Mt. Stewart. Vice-Pres., Lowell Younker, Brackley Point, Secretary, John Smethurst, Marshfield. Appointed as members for the Provincial and for Queens County Committees were Walter McDonald and Elmer McQuaid.
