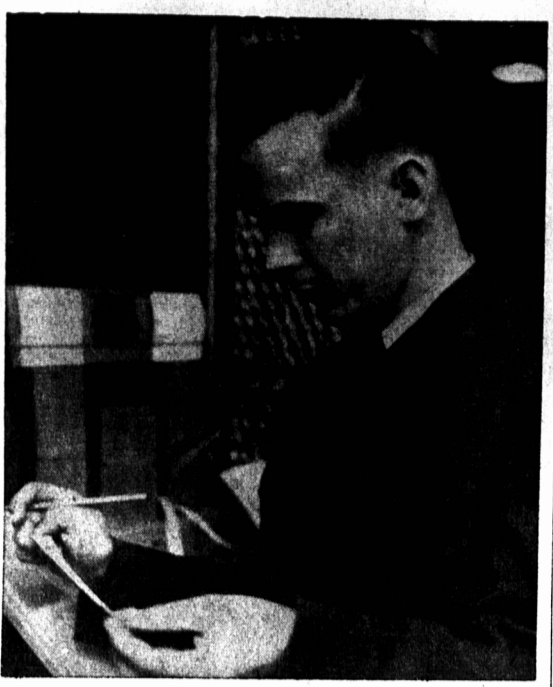

## Returns From Pleasant Visit Across Continent

Hon. W. F. Alan Stewart, Minister of Welfare and Labour has returned from a meeting of Canadian Administration and Labour Legislation held in the City of Regina, attended by Provincial Labour Ministers and Deputies from coast to coast.

After the Regina conference, Mr. Stewart took the opportunity of visiting some friends and relatives in British Columbia, Alberta, and in the State of California. He stopped over for two days in Montreal on his return journey where he visited his daughters, one of whom is a student nurse at Montreal General Hospital and the other a second year physio and occupational therapist student at McGill University.

Mr. Stewart made a visit to Los Angeles where he stayed with his sister, Mrs. A. G. Ligertwood. While in that city he saw Mr. Ralph Windsor, formerly of Charlottetown, who is now personnel manager for the Bank of America, during Mr. Stewart's visit to Los Angeles he was fortunate enough to strike the much publicized heat wave experienced in that area. The temperature at times was 110.

From Los Angeles, Mr. Stewart went to Olympia, the capital of California where he visited a cousin, Mrs. Mary Watson, the former Mollie Warburton of Charlottetown, daughter of Dr. George Warburton. Back into Canada the Welfare Minister stayed with another cousin, W. Eric Warburton of Vancouver, son of the late Dr. James Warburton. Mr. and Mrs. Warburton conduct one of the largest private nursing homes in the Province of British Columbia.

At Creston, B. C., in the Kootenay valley, Mr. Stewart had a pleasant experience of viewing what he termed some of the finest farmland he has ever seen. The soil is of very great depth and crops of oats yielding 100 bushels to the acre were not unusual. The valley area is also very fine orchard country. His host in the Kootenay Valley was Mr. Frank Putnam, former Minister of Agriculture for British Columbia.

Another Islander on Mr. Stewart's visiting list was Mrs. John Holroyd of Pincher Creek, Alberta, who is a daughter of the late Judge Warburton of this City. He was at an elevation of 6,000 feet at Pincher Creek and recalls that on the day of his visit on September 20, it was snowing quite a bit at the peak of the elevation.

Altogether Mr. Stewart was away from the Province for a little over a month. Back in his office as Minister of Welfare yesterday, he said he was a bit weary at the end of the journey but, in all, considered it a very refreshing experience.

**OTTAWA (CP)—**The navy announced Thursday that 91 newly-enrolled naval cadets are studying at Canada's three service colleges as part of the regular officers training plan. The regular officers are Royal Roads, near Victoria; Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., and College Militaire Royal, St. Jean, Que. Under the plan, cadets study at government expense and join the services as regular officers on graduation.

## Spring Park To Conduct Sewage And Water Survey

The commissioners of Spring Park Village last night were granted permission to secure the services of an engineer to conduct a survey, submit plans and estimates of the cost of undertaking a water and sewage disposal system within the village.

Mr. J. Edmund Arsenault, Chairman of the Commissioners presided at the meeting which was attended by about 40 ratepayers. The resolution granting the authority to the commissioners stipulates that the consultant engineer carry out the survey at no cost to the village, but that he be given an equal or better chance than Mr. Alex MacIsaac who spoke further agreed that if the work was not carried out before the termination of a year after the survey, the engineer would be paid the sum of \$400.

It is estimated that there are about 250 dwellings in the village. About 94 of these are connected to the City water supply but none have City sewage. This leaves the majority of the homes with a private water and sewage system. The matter of water and sewage in Spring Park has been a problem for some time and the ratepayers believe that something concrete must be undertaken at an early date. Present at the meeting was Mr. Alex MacIsaac who spoke briefly on the subject.

## Improving Grounds In Vicinity Of Cenotaph

A joint movement by the Provincial Government and the City authorities, designed to create a proper atmosphere in the vicinity of the cenotaph in Queen's Square, has been set on foot. The work is gradually taking shape.

The curb on the south side of Grafton Street running for about 100 feet in front of the Cenotaph has been removed and will be replaced by a new one in a straight line. The walk on each side of the memorial will carry right through but will curve gracefully to an equal extent on each side, conforming to a pattern. The South, or inner side of the area surrounding the war monument will run deeper into the Square proper, making the setting for the memorial much larger.

The enlarged area, with the cenotaph as the central object will be landscaped and possibly decorated with suitable shrubs and enclosed in a manner yet to be determined. The work of outlining the chosen area with a new curb and the preparation of the ground for landscaping is being done by City employees under the supervision of Mr. Joseph Costello, City Foreman, and is expected to be completed for use on Armistice Day.

The long weekend, Saturday to Monday inclusive, gives promise of considerable activity on the part of the Maritime Phalanx and Phial Association which opens its annual conference at the Y. M. C. A. with a dinner meeting on Saturday evening at which City Councillor J. Walthen Gaudet will be guest speaker.

More than 50 members of the organization from various points in the Maritime Provinces have signified their intention to join the 30 members of the city branches at the Conference which will be chaired by Barry Beers, President of the Charlottetown Phalanx unit. The theme of the meetings will be "What Lies Ahead?"

The luncheon meeting on Sunday will be addressed by Dr. Frank MacKinnon and on Monday at a similar function the guest speaker will be Rev. Marvel Dunbar. Assistance will be given the discussion groups by Dr. George Fisher, Gordon Maxwell and Al. Tyler, General Secretary Y. M. C. A., Moncton.

insurance "in more detail." There were these other offshoots of the conference:

1. Federal and provincial officials met to discuss the federal offer to pay half the costs of jobless relief in provinces where unemployment is more than 45 per cent of the population. Mr. St. Laurent said some provinces have initiated a draft agreement but he would not name them.
2. The premiers agreed to meet later this year to consider ways of speeding up work on the Trans-Canada highway and study other provincial proposals for initiating public works projects.
3. The premiers agreed to set up a body of federal-provincial deputy finance ministers as a permanent link among the 11 governments. Head man likely will be Kenneth Taylor, federal deputy finance minister. The members will not make recommendations but merely report back to their respective governments.

Mr. St. Laurent said the premiers agreed to leave it to him to decide when and if another federal-provincial conference will be called. It may be, he said, after exchanging correspondence with the premiers on various tax proposals the work of negotiating a new formula will be done through the mails. But he intimated that a new conference likely will be called before the end of 1955—the third this year.
