Schooner Lost.
St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 24.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Jan. 24.
Three more vessels have been given up as lost, making a record of fourteen vessels and some 200 men.
Terrible Explosion in a Mine.
DENVER, Col., Jan. 24.
Over fifty men were killed here to-day by an explosion in a mine. None of the bodies have been yet recovered.
Banquet at Cork.
CORK, Jan. 24.
A banquet was given here yesterday in honor of Messrs. Power and Leamy, Members of Parliament for Waterford city. Mr. Thos. Seaton replied to the toast "Ireland a Nation."
Meetings Prohibited in Ireland.
LONDON, Jan. 24.
Nationalist and Orange meetings announced to be held at Castle William, County Down, on the 29th, have been forbidden by proclamation.
Stables Burned—Fourteen Horses Perish.
LONDON, Jan. 24.
Lord Norrey's stables, near Oxford, were burned last night, together with fourteen valuable horses, one of them having been a winner of the Derby in 1879.
Parliamentary Matters.
OTTAWA, Jan. 24.
The Session of the House to-day was very short, lasting only until four o'clock; most of the time being taken up with motions for papers. Nothing has yet been done in Parliament.
Latest News from Egypt.
LONDON, Jan. 24.
Gen. Gordon arrived at Port Said yesterday, where he was received by Gen. Wood, Commander of the British forces in Egypt.
The Suakin route to Khartoum has been abandoned. The road by way of Korosko, which is near Wadihulfas and the second cataract of the Nile, being the only one now feasible.
Gen. Gordon will arrive at Cairo to-night.
The Standard's correspondent at Cairo says:—"El Mahdi's brother-in-law, who was recently captured at Minieh, has made a statement which has been handed to the Minister of the Interior. In the statement he gives an account of El Mahdi's plans and surroundings."
