PREMIER SPEAKS TO 'COUNTRY CAUCUS'

Province To Establish Marketing Department

Premier A. W. Matheson announced Friday that the Island government was preparing to set up a marketing department. Speaking to the group of Island farmers and agriculturists attending the dinner meeting which closed the first day of the two-day Country Caucus being held at St. Dunstan's University, the premier said that the new department would be similar in function to those now operating in the other provinces.

The new governmental agency would concern itself with sales promotion through advertising and public relations programs, the premier said. The minister of agriculture, Hon. Eugene Cullen noted that such a scheme was long overdue and must be instituted if the growers hope to save the industry. Mr. Cullen warned those present that they must be willing "to

take their costs off" and go to work if the plan is going to succeed. "You can't sit with your hands folded and expect miracles to happen," he added. The guest speaker of the evening, Mr. Waldo Walsh, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Nova Scotia, told the meeting that vertical integration threatens to destroy the independence which farmers have for centuries enjoyed. He said the only way to combat this wholesale system of farming was for farmers to organize themselves to control not only the production but the marketing as well. "This is your only hope of survival in agriculture," he said.

Island Ayrshires Show Up Well In Production Records

The July issue of the "Canadian Ayrshire Review" lists several Island Ayrshires whose 240-305 day records were received in the Association Office from May 16 to June 15, 1959. Names of sires are given in brackets. All the cows listed have scored 120 per cent of more of breed class average in both milk and fat. SUMMERSIDE—An estimated 5,000 Islanders and visitors thronged to Lennox Island yesterday to join the resident Micmac Indians on their reservation in celebrating St. Ann's Sunday.

A fleet of 17 fishing boats ferried the large crowd across the half-mile sheet of water and with a sunny day and a calm sea, the brief water outing was one of the highlights for many of the visitors.

Solemn High Mass on the church grounds was celebrated at 11 o'clock with a large attendance.

The celebrant was Rev. Thomas McLellan, Ph.D., professor at St. Dunstan's University; Deacon was Rev. Reginald Phelan, Lot 11; sub-deacon, Rev. Pius Murnaghan, Grand River.

The sermon was preached by Rev. Reginald Phelan and the organist and choir director was Sister St. Anthony of the Notre Dame Sisters, St. Mary's Convent, Summerside. Rev. E. W. MacInnis is pastor of Lennox Island.

The choir was comprised exclusively of Indians. After leaving the wharf at Lennox Island the first attraction for visitors was the handicraft booth manned by Miss Elizabeth Mitchell. Here were displayed a large and handsome collection of baskets, tomahawks, bows and arrows and several other of the Indian crafts.

Large numbers stopped next at the shrine of St. Anne where they knelt in prayer on the steps leading to the summit of the shrine. From there, the crowd wandered to the games area where motor driven swings were kept busy by the kiddies and games and other amusements were there for the older folks.

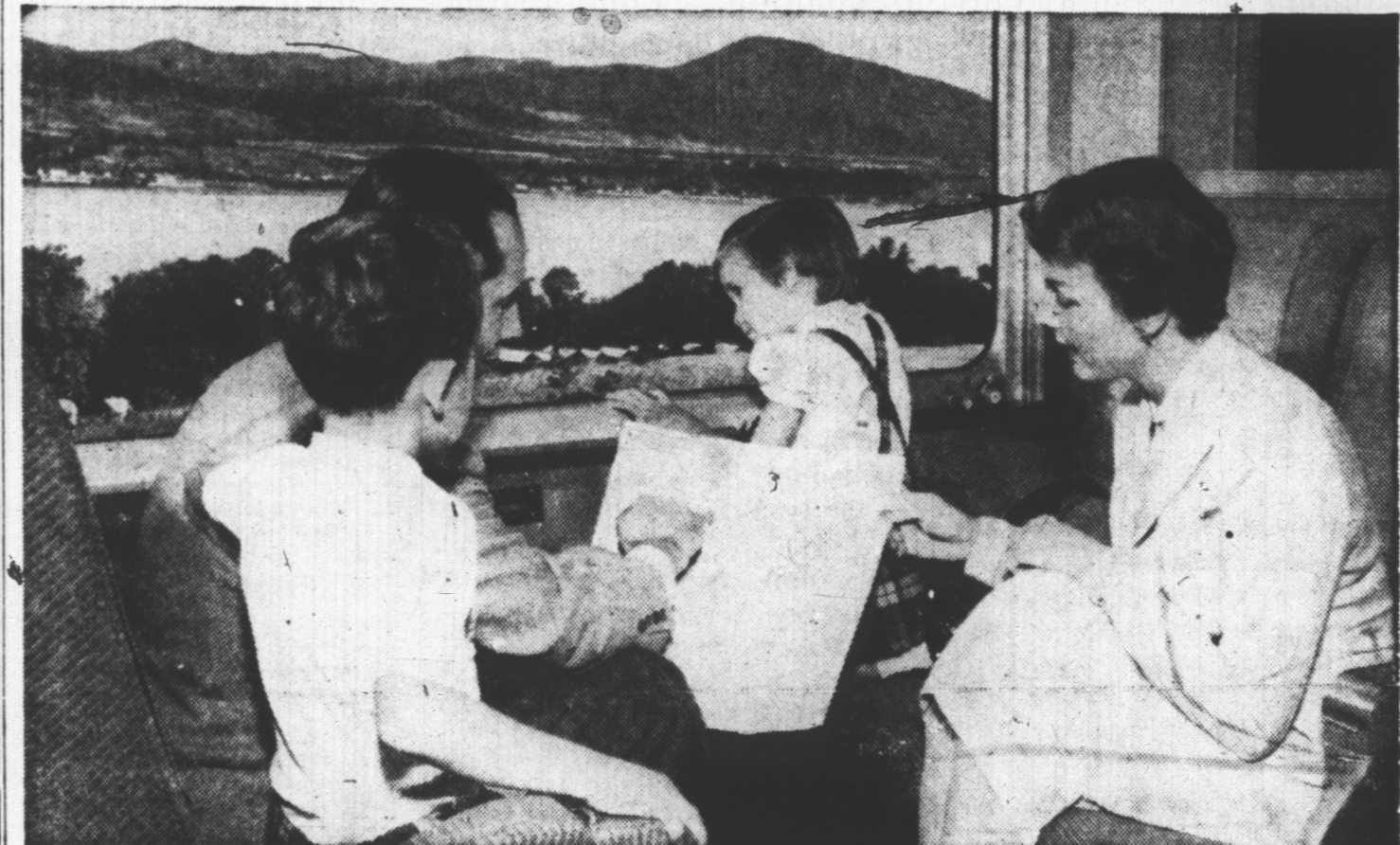
