FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Tiber arrived from Montreal with a general cargo on Saturday and left again for Halifax and St. John's N.S.

HOOK AND LADDER.—There will be a meeting of the Hook and Ladder Company this evening at half-past seven o'clock. Important business.

THE BANK STAND.—The Salvation Army have not yet rented the land stand. A board upon which the words "To Let" were painted was hanging out yesterday.

SAVINGS BANK RETURNS.—According to the very latest returns, the deposits in the Dominion Government Savings Banks during July amounted to \$360,858; withdrawals \$355,114.

PICNIC POSTPONED.—The S. O. E. picnic, on account of the rain, has been postponed till to-morrow. The Jacques Cartier leaves the wharf at 9.30 for the picnic grounds, weather favorable.

A. O. H.—A full attendance of the members of Division No. 1, in regalia, is requested at their rooms to-morrow (Tuesday) morning at 8 o'clock, to attend the funeral of their late Brother, James McDonald.

DOG TAX.—Already \$185 have been collected from the owners of dogs. Last year the receipts from the same source amounted to \$270. The names of those who have not paid up have been handed in to the clerk of the Magistrate's Court, and they will be summoned at once.

THE PASSENGER TRADE.—The steamers "Halifax" and "Oliveville" of the Plant Line are carrying an increased number of passengers between Boston and the Provinces, thus proving the popularity of these favorite steamers and the direct one-night-at-sea route of the Plant Line.

ATTEND TO THEM.—The plankwalks on the Ferry Wharf are in a bad state, and should be attended to at once. As they are at present, it is hardly safe for persons to walk down the wharf. In some cases, whole planks have been removed, and in others the planks are very rotten and loose. The railing or fence along the side of the wharf is also badly in need of attention.

EXCHANGED PULPITS.—The Rev. Geo. M. Campbell, of Charlottetown, preached in Wesleyan Memorial Church, Moncton, yesterday morning and evening. Subject in the morning, "God's Light-house"; in the evening, "Humanity's Great Sin."

Rev. John Reel, of Moncton, preached in the First Methodist Church here at both services yesterday.

FISHING NOTES.—Souris, August 16: In port, sch Bluejay, Gloucester; sch Oriole; sch Ellen, from Margaree, 12 bbls mackerel; cruiser Kingfisher, sch Union, 40 bbls mackerel, which were bought by Geo. W. Morrow for DeLong & Seaman, Boston. The captain of the Union reports some catches of mackerel around the Provinces, and that most of the American fleet are there.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, John Morgan for assaulting John McPherson was fined \$5 and \$2.50 costs or thirty days imprisonment. The assault grew out of a dispute between the two men concerning the carrying of visitors to the warship. Daniel Carroll was fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness. Lottie Dover, charged with vagrancy, was remanded until the 26th.

The Court Act summons against Angus Macdonald, third offence, was adjourned until Wednesday next.

MANUSCRIPT FREE.—A large number of teachers have already made application to Principal L. B. Miller, of the Charlottetown Business College and Writing Academy for manuscript of the course in bookkeeping which he has prepared for the Prince of Wales College course during the ensuing term. In order to encourage a study in this science, Principal Miller has not only offered valuable prizes (see Provincial Exhibition prize list opposite page 34), but will furnish applicants with manuscript free.

TO BEID HERE.—We hear that Alex. Macdonald, of Charlottetown, one of the Standard Oil magnates, has bought Carr's Pond, Lot 34, and a considerable portion of the land surrounding it. It is said to be Mr. Macdonald's intention to erect a magnificent residence upon his newly acquired land. He also intends to stock the pond with fish and reserve it for the use of himself and guests. The work of building the house will probably be commenced hereabout. Mr. Macdonald has been a guest at the Acadia Hotel for the past two or three weeks, and is delighted with the country.

MISSY STOLEN.—Yesterday afternoon the widow of Augustus Hermans, living on Lower Queen Street, left her house to attend to some matters outside. There was a countryman in the house when she left it. On her return she found the latter sitting at the counter with a twenty-dollar gold piece, two five dollar notes and one dollar note had also disappeared from her purse, which she left in the cupboard. She suspected that the countryman, knowing Mr. Hermans, had taken the money, and followed him to the Ferry Wharf and accused him of the theft. He denied all knowledge of it, however. Mrs. Hermans says the money was in the purse when she last saw it at noon yesterday. She has reported the facts to the police.

A PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—The Guardian reports that Mr. Malcolm S. McLeod, of Yeg, brother of Dr. McLeod, of this city, had his nose broken in several places and his head badly cut as a result of a run-away accident, which occurred a few days ago. It seems that Mr. McLeod had just returned from Venon River, and his horse was standing at the door of his residence. Mr. McLeod was standing alongside the carriage and his little boy was seated in it. The horse suddenly bolted, throwing Mr. McLeod in front of the wheel which came in contact with his nose. In this position Mr. McLeod was dragged for a short distance, as he did not want to let go the reins in case an accident would befall his son.

A STRANGE DEATH.—A sudden and sad death occurred at Freeport Station Friday. Mrs. George Taylor, being the victim. Mr. Taylor is a carpenter, and was away from home for the day working at his trade. Mrs. Taylor had a young sister staying with her, and the latter was away during the forenoon picking berries. She came home and found Mrs. Taylor in her bedroom dead. Dr. McNeill of Kensington was hastily summoned, and as near as he could tell Mrs. Taylor had expired about two hours prior to being found, and it is believed heart failure was the cause of death. It appears some of the neighbor children heard Mrs. Taylor's cries crying before the sister came home, but only went as far as the door. The deceased was a daughter of Mr. John Cairns, Lower Freetown.—Pioneer.

THE WORLD OF SPORT.

Cricket. The cricket match, Moncton vs. Charlottetown, on the former's grounds, on Friday and Saturday last, resulted in a victory for the Monctonians by 15 runs, the total score standing 114 to 99. The telegraph in the second innings showed 77-53 for eleven wickets. For the home team McQuillan and Seale bowled well, the former very effectively, while the steadily batting of Moore and Seale was commented on, the former making top score each innings, 15 in first and 21 in second. For Moncton, Ackman and Robb bowled splendidly and rather effectively against the visitors. In the evening the Islanders were taken for a drive through the city and well entertained. An interested spectator of the game on Friday afternoon was Fred Bevan, well known in Charlottetown, who is now in Moncton for a short time, and then leaves, he says, for New York. A return match will likely be played at Victoria Park in the near future.

The Wheel. Frank Albert, ex-100 mile champion of the world, was a spectator at the track on Saturday evening. Caldwell, one of the Summerside racing contingent, was also present, and had a spin during the evening.

THE STORM.—A lightning and thunder storm accompanied by a heavy rainfall, began about ten o'clock last night. The lightning and thunder did not abate for two or three hours, and the rain continued to fall well on into this forenoon. The wind was high and changeable, blowing from nearly every point of the compass. W. A. Weeks & Co.'s new swinging sign came to grief during the forenoon, and the awning at the Hotel Davies was blown down. Several trees were blown down, and the telegraph wires in some sections are crossed. We fear considerable damage to the crops, and some disasters at sea. The St. Lawrence and Northumberland left at the usual time this morning. The St. Lawrence left Pictou on return to Charlottetown at 3.15.

LOTS OF NERVE.—A wonderful example of coolness and nerve was noted to the Herald a day or two ago. Some time ago an old man named Marsh, who lives on the road leading to Point Aconi, about midway between the bridge and Sullivan's, started to sink a shaft in order to take out some coal for his own use. After he got down a certain distance he thought he would be able to proceed much farther and faster if he used dynamite, so he prepared several and attempted to set them off, but unfortunately his apparatus was in some way defective and they would not go off. After trying several times to set off the dynamite he gave up and took it out again, and he actually succeeded in digging and picking it at last succeeded in getting it all out. When the tremendous risk this man had to run in order to get the dynamite out is considered, it seems really wonderful that anyone would have the hardihood and courage to venture so much for such a slight return.—North Sydney Herald.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. Paris, August 16.—Figaro commenting on the massacre of missionaries in China says: "We are nearer today to a collective expedition of European naval forces to the far east than we were when the Japanese allies were resolutely marching on Peking."

Pasadena, Ill., August 16.—Sheriff Clarke with ten deputies, arrived at Spring Valley this morning, with warrants for the arrest of 34 Italians charged with assaulting, shooting, and driving the entire colored population out of Spring Valley. The complaint is signed by Charles I. Martin, colored, who upon examination was found to have 47 shots in his back, and 12 in his head and neck. The sheriff captured a few deputies at the top of each shaft, and arrested the men this afternoon, as fast as they came up.

Memphis, Tenn., August 16.—The log house of Mrs. Herring, near Arlington, and two daughters were burned to death. Fuel pile was suspected, and the sheriff has taken to the scene with bloodhounds.

Montreal, August 16.—Farm laborers to the number of 2,345 who went to Manitoba from Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, have all obtained employment. The following despatch was received here today: "Twenty-five per cent. of the wheat will be cut to-morrow and 75 per cent. the following Saturday. The farm laborers distributed throughout the country are being rapidly snapped up. Wages from \$25 to \$40 per month. The impression is that the local government estimate of 25 bushels per acre is under the mark and that the yield will be at least 28 bushels per acre."
