PEI Ayrshires Make Good Showing At Winter Fair

AMHERST N.S. (Special) — Prince Edward Island breeders were holding their own in heavy competition that developed in the Ayrshire ring Thursday at the Maritime Winter Fair. All three took the top prizes in the heavy class, and the Ayrshires made a good showing in the other classes.

The MacRaes got there several times. They started to score most heavily in the female classes. They made three in a row when they took the classes for senior yearling heifers, two-year-old heifers dry and three-year-old in that order. There were several surprises. The victory of the bull Glen Garry Snows Burton, in the battle for the senior and grand championships upset the defending champion Fairview Fashion Classman. The Classman had been unbeaten in recent years both here and in Charlottetown and he stood third in a strong class last year at the Royal.

The animal placed second in his class to Campbell Reilly Royal, the bull that took senior and grand championship.

For Charles Robinson and Sons of Harvey Station, N.B. the reserve senior champion was shown by W.J. Taylor of Rothesay, N.B. The junior male champion and reserve grand was shown by Donald Bantry Bay Farm of St. Andrews, N.B., and the reserve Jr. champion won by W.J. Maxwell and Son of Westville, R.R., N.S.

The junior female champion was shown by Malcolm MacKay and the reserve by the Bantry day Farm.
