S'ide Harbor To Be Dredged

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
A letter from Solicitor-General J. Watson MacNaught and Alex Campbell, secretary of the Summerside Board of Trade, read at a lobster carnival meeting last night, noted that arrangements have been completed for the dredging of Summerside harbor this spring.

The operation, the Liberal MP for Prince said, will clear up any refuse deposited in the harbor since the last dredging a few years ago and would result in a 10-foot depth.

An extensive dredging program has also been arranged for next year. Mr. MacNaught said, involving the expenditure of well over \$150,000.

This program, when completed, will give Summerside a straight channel located on a line from the range lights and having a width of 200 feet and a depth of 22 feet below low water. "This will mean an increase in overall depth of the harbor of five feet", the letter stated.

Mr. MacNaught felt sure this additional depth would be of much value to shippers and other users of the harbor.

Voucher Holders Jam Drama Ticket Office

The exchange of vouchers for tickets for the eight performances of the Dominion Drama Festival finals here May 12-19 began yesterday at the DDF office on Great George Street.

Today (10:30-12:30, 2:00-6:00) those having "series vouchers" good for all eight plays, can choose their seats in the Confederation Centre theatre for the finals.

Single vouchers for opening and closing nights will be exchanged tomorrow, Thursday and Friday mornings (10:00-12:30).

The ticket committee reports that the theatre is considerably sold out for those two performances, with the exception of about six series tickets now unsold.

SOLD OUT
Island enthusiasts have already built out the allotment of seats for the two big nights for last patrons. However, it is estimated that there are 200 series tickets left for out-of-province visitors, and officials say these are being snapped up at an alarming rate.

A total of 304 series tickets already sold insures that when Canada's top amateur plays are presented they will have good-sized audiences.

Sales of both series and single seats remain for the plays presented between the 18th and the 23rd.

1,000 Pounds Of Butter Is Missing

Police Chief Sterns Webster said last night that investigation into a suspected break, entry and theft at the butter warehouse of the main plant of General Creameries Limited on Filzroy Street is being pushed by his department.

The incident is said to have occurred sometime Sunday night.

The theft was first discovered early Monday morning by Gerald Doyle, Charlottetown, an employee at the plant. A check of butter stocks later revealed that twenty-one 50-pound cases of butter were taken from the warehouse. The missing 1,000 pounds of butter was wrapped into one-pound packages.

The chief reported that a thorough search of windows, doors and other possible means of access to the building by Const. Charles Beady and other police officers, failed to disclose by what means the thieves made entry into the building.

Mayor Ernest J. Morrison, who was elected to this top civic post two years ago, is being opposed by W.E. Jenkins, a former councillor. In the West Ward, Mrs. Frances Perry, the first woman to sit in council when elected two years ago, has as her opponent, another former councillor, Fred Arsenault.

Veteran councillor, Herb Schurman, is being opposed in the East Ward by Grant Molison, who is throwing his hat into the ring for the first time. A veteran, Mr. Molison is the son of a former councillor.

The third councillor, George Key, Jr., went in by acclamation last Tuesday.

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
