LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

TONIGHT.—Frankie at the Opera House.

SUPREME COURT.—The court met at eleven o'clock and adjourned until to-morrow at the same hour.

THE WEATHER.—Moderate winds mostly westerly; fine today and Friday, not much change in temperature.

LAST SAILING.—The last steamer of the Dobell Line coming to Charlottetown this season will probably leave Montreal about the 10th inst.

ST. PETER'S SOCIAL.—The annual "social" of St. Peter's Church congregation held last evening was a pleasant affair with music, recitations, games and coffee and cake.

BELFAST ELECTION.—Writs are out for an election in the Belfast District. Wednesday the 17th inst., will be Nomination Day, and that day week will be election day.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Geo. V. Moore was fined \$25 and costs or two months imprisonment for violating the Liquor Regulation Act by selling in a place having more than one door.

SCHOOL SAVINGS BANK.—The Farmer reports that the public school savings bank established in Summerside some time ago is so far proving an unqualified success—the weekly deposits averaging between \$30 and \$40.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Greetslands, of the Dobell Line, left this morning for St. John's, Nfld., via the Sydneys. She took a general freight between deck and horses on deck. Mr. Geo. Aylward is a passenger to St. John's.

WINDSOR FIRE.—The balance of articles contributed to the relief of the sufferers by the Windsor fire was forwarded today as follows:—15 pairs sashes, 2 doors, 4 boxes groceries, 4 cases clothing, 16 chairs, 4 bedsteads, 5 mattresses.

ROBBERY AT SHEDIAC.—Mr. Joseph Gallant, a hotel keeper at Shediac, kept \$400 in a trunk in his bedroom. At some time unknown he claims that his room was entered and the trunk rifled of the money. The matter has been placed in the hands of the authorities.

CHANGE OF DATE.—The Rev. R. S. Crisp will deliver his popular lecture on "Odd Parsons and Odd People" on Monday next November 8th in Grace Church. Get your tickets early. Mr. Crisp is said to be one of the greatest lecturers in the Maritime Provinces. Don't forget that the date changed from Nov 16 to Nov 8.

PRICE OF HORSES.—The horse market in Boston during the last week is said to have been fairly active. Consignments have been just about equal to the demand. Prices have not advanced. Prices are: Ordinary to common, \$40 to \$50, common to good, \$60 to \$75, and good to extra, \$75 to \$150. The latter are for clean, sound, well made and well broken stock.

BANK STOCK INCREASED.—A special meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of Nova Scotia was held at Halifax on Tuesday for the purpose of authorizing the directors to increase the capital stock from \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000. It was unanimously decided to issue additional stock at such time as the directors may decide. One reason given for the issue was that an agency of the bank had been opened at Toronto, and in consequence more capital would be required. The time at which the stock will be issued lies with the directors.

THE WINDSOR FIRE.—Fletcher, the Windsor fire bug, was up for examination on Tuesday. Croxen, who was put on the stand, said that when the fire was discovered no attempt was made to put it out. After they had got away from the house Fletcher went back and locked the door. Fletcher did not give any alarm. McIntyre also gave evidence saying that he had been in Fletcher's place till two o'clock on Sunday morning, drinking beer and rum. Fletcher asked him to leave, saying that he had a "job to do."

GREAT PRESENCE OF MIND.—William Langan, a nail maker, who is an employe in the West End nail works, had a narrow escape from death yesterday about noon and practically saved his life by his presence of mind and cool head. Langan was at work on a machine which was rapidly making nails when in some way the clothing on his arm caught on the wire which was being fed into the machine and in a few moments the young man's arm was nearly twisted out of the socket and his fingers were badly mangled by the rapidly working machinery. With great presence of mind the injured man reached for the belt and slipping the latter off the wheel stopped the machinery and practically saved his life.—St. John Telegraph.

SUMMERSIDE NOTES.

As the readers of THE EXAMINER are already aware, the Paulist Fathers are this week holding a Mission in St. Paul's Church here. Their sermons are highly spoken of by citizens of all denominations, and the church is crowded at all the services. The evening services held at 7.30 are the most thronged when Catholic and non-Catholics congregate to hear the Fathers.

LONGEVITY IN CONVENTS.

In connection with Sister St. Ursule's celebration of the 70th anniversary of her admission to the Congregation of Notre Dame, the True Witness draws attention to the length of life enjoyed by the members of religious orders. Sister St. Ursule is indeed a notable example of this longevity. Born in 1809, she has passed 84 years of her life in the nunnery, and after an active and laborious career, she enjoys perfect health, hearing and eyesight. Her mental and physical vigor is astonishing; her cheeks are rosy, the pains of rheumatism are unknown to her, her memory is clear, and her intellect bright. Her most cherished ornament is a silver cross which she has worn for 70 years. It was given to her by a former Sister St. Ursule, who trained her and who herself wore the cross for seventy years so that in two lives it has seen 140 years' service in the Congregation of Notre Dame. Three Sisters in the convent have been nuns for 70 years, 29 for 60 years, and 75 for half a century. The facts are striking, but they need occasion little surprise, when one comes to consider the circumstances. The sisters live a regular life, free from the cares and worries of the world. They have simple fare, and are engaged in teaching, which is hard work, but neither of the conditions tend to shorten life. Like most human instruments, the intellect improves by use, and some of the oldest men have been those who have put their brains to most continual employment. It is abuse, not use, that wears out the human frame, and not work, but worry that kills. The nuns point a useful lesson in reminding us that a pure, simple, active life conduces to longevity as well as to happiness.
