THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.

Corean Mission Discussed.

Next Session in Halifax.

Moxcross, Oct. 7.—In the Presbyterian Synod yesterday the Corean mission was discussed. Rev. A. Gaudier, seconded by Rev. T. C. Jack, moved in favor of undertaking the mission. An amendment against its adoption was moved by Rev. Jas. McLean seconded by Mr. T. C. James. Adjournment interrupted the discussion. The next session is appointed to meet in St. Matthews Church, Halifax.

To Grant Autonomy.

MADRID, Oct. 7.—At the Cabinet council last evening the government decided to grant autonomy to Cuba under the suzerainty of Spain and to continue the campaign as long as may be necessary.

The Fast Line Contract.

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier today received a de-patch from Hon. Mr. Fielding in London to the effect that Peterson, Tate & Co. had made the deposit necessary to bind the fast line contract.

A Disastrous Fire.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—The fire which has swept the southern portion of Russell County is the most disastrous ever witnessed in this section.

LOBSTER FISHING.—Before A. Lord, Fishery Officer, yesterday, William A. McDonald, of Point Prim, was fined \$20 and cost or one month's imprisonment for violating the law regulating lobster fishing. Mr. Macdonald elected to go to jail as he did not have the money to pay his fine. Charles McEachern of Little Sands was also fined a like sum for a similar offence, but at the request of prosecutor Holkirk he was given one month to pay his fine. Three other cases were dismissed, and in another prosecution costs only were imposed as there were extenuating circumstances.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

MANCHESTER, Oct. 5.—The Manchester Courier is informed that there is a difference of opinion between the foreign office and United States Ambassador, Colonel Hay, as to whether the latter verbally told Lord Salisbury that President McKinley expected Russia and Japan to be represented in the Behring Sea conference at Washington.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—John Redmond, Parnellite member of parliament for Waterford, in the course of an interview published today, denies the statements which have appeared in the United States press representing him as opposed to the candidacy of John Daly for the mayoralty of Limerick. Mr. Redmond says: "The independent league is taking no part in the matter, as it is purely local. I may say also that none of us attach much importance to the agitation for a royal residence in Ireland. It is quite untrue that John Parnell is ever advocated."

LONDON, October 5.—The news from the Italian frontier is favorable. Sir William Lockhart's forces will commence the advance on Tiarh, the summer headquarters of the Afridis and the Orakza's from Peshawur, on Friday next, moving in three columns. Sir William Lockhart and Major General Lord Methuen have already arrived at Kohat. The Mullahs of Tiarh, on hearing of the advance contemplated, began their preparations to oppose it, but it is now also reported that they are prepared to offer terms on behalf of the Afridis, the Mahomounds and the Malakau tribesmen.

BOMBAY, October 4.—Damodar Chappokar Deccani, Brahm advocate, and twenty-eight others, have been arrested for the murder of plague commissioner Rand and Lieut. Averse, while engaged last June in the Poonah district in enforcing the sanitary regulations. They were shot while leaving the governor's reception at Cane-kind. The murderers were concealed behind some trees. Lieut. Averse died instantly and Mr. Rand shortly afterwards. The arrested men have confessed the murder. Deccani apparently was the principal in the crime. He also confessed to having tarred the queen's statue in this city last year, and acknowledged other offences. Says he shot Lieut. Averse because he supposed the latter had witnessed the attack on Mr. Rand. The police are now seeking his accomplice. He became embittered against the Europeans because the authorities at Simla declined his offer to enlist in the Indian army.

THE ARMY OF RUSSIA.

The Army of the Czar of Russia is composed of twenty-one corps d'armes, divided up into fourteen conscriptions. The strength of each corps is about 45,000 men. The infantry comprises about 165 regiments of the line, twenty regiments of chasseurs, sixteen regiments of grenadiers, and twelve regiments of the guard, says an exchange. This is a very fine army, well organized, of great resisting power and prodigious tenacity. It is armed with a repeating rifle very much like the French Lebel and which is highly esteemed by the Russian Generals. The artillery is composed of ninety-six siege batteries, 194 field batteries, fifteen mountain batteries, forty three batteries a cheval, and three mortar regiments—altogether nearly 5000 light pieces and 1500 siege guns. Besides these there are brigades of engineers, military trains, railroad electricians, torpedoists, velocipedists, police, etc. As to the imperial cavalry it is well known to be one of the finest and by far the most considerable in Europe. It is composed of regulars and regiments like Cossacks for example, who enjoy a certain degree of independence and some privileges, and who yet submit to the usual discipline. This cavalry is divided into 671 squadrons, of which 352 are regular cavalry, cuirassiers, dragons, uhlaus and hussars and 319 Cossacks.
