Police Warn Parking Looms Major Problem

Parking is expected to pose a major problem with this week's visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

In view of the impending traffic problem, city police have advised motorists that they will not be permitted to park anywhere on the streets along which the official parades will pass.

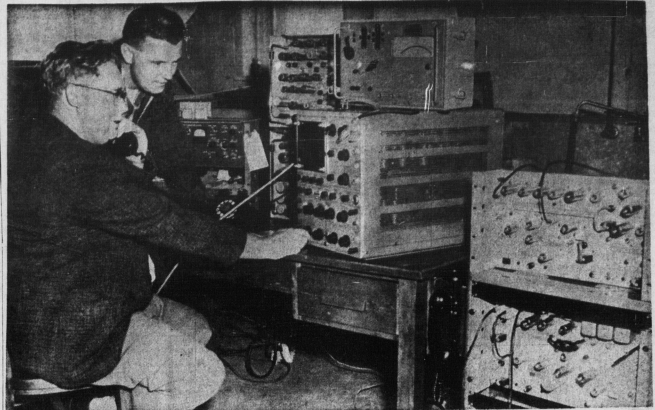
Drivers are asked to make their plans far enough in advance to park their cars away from the centre of the city or any of the streets over which the Royal Motorcade will pass. Police Chief Sterns Webster points out that no exception will be made. Any vehicle found parked on any part of a parade route will be towed away on police orders and any charges that might result will be against the owner.

NO TRAFFIC
The first of the parades, scheduled for Tuesday will see streets cleared of traffic as the Royal motorcade leaves the department of transport wharf at 2:28 p.m.

Their route with RCMP motorcycle escort, will be on Queen, Water, Haviland, Bedford and Kent Streets to Government Pond Road and McGill Avenue and along on Avenue from there parade will move up North River Road to McGill Avenue and along on Brook Street, Brighton Road, Euston, Queen and Gratton Streets to Confederation Centre.

This route has been designed to permit patients at the Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island Hospitals and at the Provincial Sanatorium and Rehabilitation Centre to see the Royal couple during the 'slow' drive.

They will return to the yacht by Gratton and Queen Streets at five o'clock. That evening they will leave the pier again at 8:14 via Queen and Gratton Streets en route to the Theban for the command performance and return to the Britannia at 10:50.

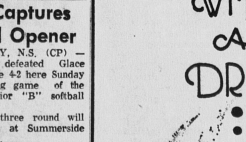
S'side Captures Softball Opener

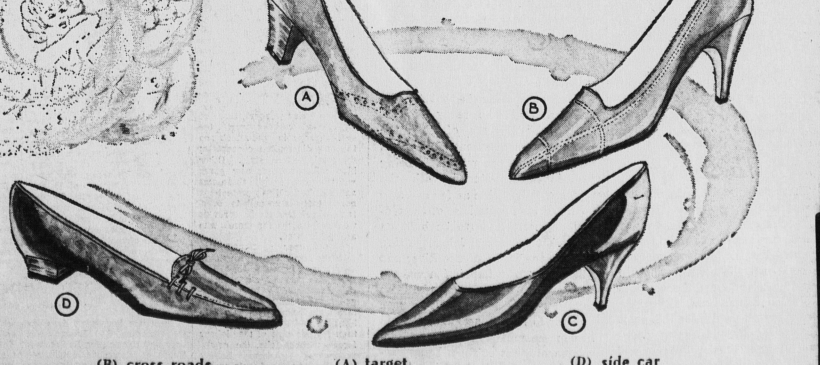
