REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF SHERWOOD CEMETERY FOR THE YEAR ENDING 4TH APRIL 1894.

Table with financial details: Subscriptions and donations \$216.00, Annual interest on \$150.00 100.50, Sale of plots and arrears collected 47.00, Fees for interments 20.00, Amount received for Keeper for building plots and sodding graves 74.50, Total receipts \$428.52.

Table with financial details: The total expenditure for the year amounted to \$411.77 and was disbursed as follows: Amount paid for salary 150.00, Amount paid for caretaking of plots of subscribers 50.00, Amount paid for extra for building plots and sodding graves 74.50, Amount paid secretary by vote of last meeting for his services 60.00.

The balance thus shown to be on hand on the year's transactions is \$26.23 to which is to be added the balance on hand from last year \$175.70 making the total balance now on hand \$201.93.

During the year seventeen burials were made, and the entire number of interments in the cemetery at the present time is 840.

The general appearance of the cemetery was much improved last year—the fences were neatly whitewashed, the hedges were trimmed and the roads and pathways kept in good order.

The Directors desire again to call attention to the fact that the keeper has established a flower garden in connection with the cemetery where flowers may be had from him at moderate prices for the adornment of graves throughout the season.

In concluding this report, the Directors beg to remind the shareholders that the cemetery is dependent for support upon the voluntary contributions of its plot-holders, and without such aid it cannot be sustained.

THE LIQUOR LAW.

Sir.—The contest which will reach its climax on the 19th inst. is now fairly under way. It becomes, therefore the bounden duty of each and every qualified voter calmly and with as little bias and prejudice as possible, to listen to and weigh the arguments advanced on each side of the question before them.

Shall the Scott Act be brought into force in this city or not? Would it be just, right and beneficial to the city to re-enact that Act? These are the questions the electors are called upon to decide on the 19th inst.

The friends and advocates of the Scott Act can, and do, make very fine and very touching ex-parte statements and appeals; but would it be just, would it be right, to render or agree on, a verdict on an "ex-parte statement?" Certainly not.

The advocates for the Scott Act, for the most part, do not want the electors to listen to the arguments of their opponents. They even claim that there is no other side to the question and try to prevent, as far as possible, the admission of any testimony which in any way conflicts with their own views.

The March Term of the County Court closed last evening yesterday after a session here of eight days. The docket consisted in all of 231 cases, of which a large number were confessed or otherwise disposed of without trial.

James K. McDonald and Wm. Harper vs. Michael P. Hogan.—Action for money had and received, \$23.23, being the balance of a quantity of slate purchased by plaintiffs from defendant for the Masonic Temple, and which they claim to have paid him twice for by mistake.

John Williams vs. Timothy Carroll.—Action of trespass and trover for sale of plaintiffs' goods, illegally distrained and sold by defendant in a workshop on Upper George Street held by plaintiff as defendant's tenant.

Joseph Taylor vs. City of Charlottetown.—Action for wages as City Surveyor and for wrongful dismissal. In this suit Judge Alley held that plaintiff was not entitled to recover on the ground that he was a salaried official of the city and subject to summary dismissal, without notice, under the Act of Incorporation.

George Gunion vs. John Gunn.—Damages for neglect of duty as bailiff and false return to capias. Tried at 5th circuit (New London). Judgment for \$25.
