Maritime Coll Stakes—The first payment of the Maritime coll stakes for 1895 will be due on March 15th. Twenty dollars is the amount of stake, to be paid in four equal instalments of \$5 each, the other three being payable in May, July and August. All claims against the coll stake or owned in the Maritime Provinces on January 1st last are eligible.

The Drama—The Dramatic Club of St. Dunstan's College are busily engaged rehearsing a farcical drama, "The Celebrated Case," which is to be presented at the Lyceum on an evening in the month of March. The drama is laid in France at the time of the battle of Fontenoy, and the story of the play is one of the deepest interest. A rich treat is in store for our theatre-goers.

Sleighs upset—The Queen Hotel sleigh was upset at the railway station this forenoon, and the four or five passengers therein were spilled out on the street. It appears that the horse started off when the driver was absent seeing about some baggage, and before the animal could be stopped a collision with another sleigh occurred. The other sleigh was also upset.

An Islander's Loss—A letter has been received from Westboro, Mass., by Mr. Benj. C. Prowse, of this city, informing him that his father, Mr. William Prowse, met with a severe loss by fire at that place on Friday last. Mr. Prowse lost his barn, a large and commodious structure, on Friday last. All Mr. Prowse's farm implements, sleigh and harness, crop and all his stock (except two horses and seven cows) were also destroyed. A quantity of lumber in the barn was also burned. The fire was caused by the explosion of a lamp. As a tremendous gale was blowing at the time, it was with difficulty the house was saved. The woodshed in connection with the house caught, and the shingles on one side of it were burned. The loss is estimated at \$1500, with \$500 insurance.

You May Call Again—Never in his history was the lecture room of Zion Church more crowded than it was last night. All the available space was occupied and a large number were turned away, being unable to gain admittance. But fortunately for the latter class Rev. Mr. Sutherland did not deliver his lecture on "My Trip to Scotland." It was to have been illustrated by magic lantern views, but an accident having happened only a few of those could be given.
