Local and Other Items

MILTON CHURCH.—Service will be held in the new Church of Milton on Sunday next at 11:30 p. m.

RUSHED WITH ORDERS.—The Halifax Herald reports that the Nappan dairy station has more orders for butter than it can fill. Shipments are being made to Bermuda and Newfoundland.

DEATH AT PICTOU.—Mr. and Mrs. Doherty, of the Revere Hotel Pictou, have the sympathy of many friends in the bereavement which has befallen them in the death of their infant child. This is the second child they have lost since locating in Pictou.

CARIBOO AND MOOSE.—Quebec is feeling young again. Recently there has been a number of moose and cariboo in the district. Five were killed at Notre Dame Station on the Great Northern, two at Black Lake and one at the Talbot reserves on the Lake St John Railway, and other tracks have been seen.

AN ISLANDER MARRIED.—The Mount Keswick correspondent of the St. John Telegraph says: On Wednesday evening, Feb. 1st, a very pleasant event occurred at the residence of Mr. Frazer Dunphy, when his eldest daughter, Miss Attie, was married to Mr. Russell Gillis, of Summerside, P. E. Island. The nuptials were performed by Rev. G. W. Foster in the presence of immediate relatives.

SOME INTERESTING FIGURES.—A man with a penchant for computation has calculated that when we are at rest we consume 500 cubic inches of air a minute. If we walk at the rate of one mile an hour we use 800, two miles, 1,000; three miles, 1,600; four miles, 2,300. If we start out and run six miles an hour we consume 3,000 cubic inches of air during every minute of the time.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—The Halifax Herald says: Returns for January from Nova Scotia mines, received at the mines' office Saturday were. Bluenose gold mining company, of Sherbrooke, crushed 1,200 tons of quartz. The yield of gold was 472 1-2 ounces. The yield from the Witrow mining company, of South Utiacke, was 88 ounces gold from 120 tons quartz. George A. Hirschfield's mine at Sherbrooke gave a return of 71 1-2 ounces from 53 tons quartz. The above mentioned gold is worth over \$12,000.

THEY'RE AFTER HIM.—The Philadelphia Record says that since the Delaware legislature passed a humorous resolution requiring Representative King, the bachelor member from Laurel, to marry within 30 days, he has received many affectionate letters from fair spinsters. The latest contained a photograph and tape-measurements of the arm, bust and ankle. These, the Record says, "caused the greatest hilarity in the house and lobby," so King must have ungraciously given the thing away.

HAD CANADIAN PRODUCE.—A report to the Department of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa gives an account of the arrival in Manchester of the largest steamer that has yet passed through the Manchester ship canal. It was the Manchester City, from St. John and Halifax, and she carried an immense cargo of Canadian products. There were 37,000 bushels of oats, 40,000 bushels of wheat, 67,000 bushels of corn, besides hay, wool-pulp, oatmeal, eggs, lard, starch, deals, doors, poultry, butter, cheese, and 400 head of cattle.

THE THIRTEEN SUPERSTITION.—Those who are sufficiently feeble-minded to take any stock in the thirteen superstition—and it is more prevalent than may be generally supposed—may be interested in knowing that the famous Astor battery, which returned from Manila with great honor, and with its ranks almost complete left New York June 13; captured a Spanish blackhouse numbered thirteen; received orders to wait for home December 13; was paid off December 13, and arrived at San Francisco Jan. 13. The battery tried to land at Pier 13, on its return to New York city, but couldn't.

A WAY THEY HAVE.—The wonder never ceases that illustrators will not read the text they illustrate. They don't all do as the New York artist, T. de Thulstrup, who caused a man to be dragged by a horse. His left foot in his right stirrup; but it's bad enough to have a picture of a coach and pair in a thick wood, with a man poking his head out of the window speaking to the coachman illustrate this: "Upon either side the white waste of a great moor stretched and rolled into the night. The coachman had come down from his box, and appeared before the door," etc.—as may be found in the current Pall Mall Magazine.

A Quarantine With Shot Guns.

LITTLE ARK, February 4.—Governor Jones will, today, send another special message to the legislature, dealing with the small pox situation. The pest row exists in half a dozen counties. In Fulton and Izard counties the disease is epidemic and much excitement prevails in neighboring localities. At Mountain Home a rigid quarantine is maintained with shot guns and no one is allowed to enter from either Fulton or Izard counties. At West Plains, Mo., a short distance away, the fear and excitement is even greater. Guards watch both day and night on the Thomasville Mountain Home and Salem wagon roads and all trains are so carefully watched that it is impossible for any person to enter the town from any locality where small pox is believed to exist. In Garden Bottom, Yell County, the disease is spreading, some families now having as many as five cases. The town of Dardanelle is quarantined, men guarding every road leading in from the Garden Bottom district.

In Quebec the estimates of the provincial expenditure for 1898-99 show that the Government contemplates an outlay next year of \$4,624,562, to be slightly added to, in the course of events, by the supplementaries. The expenditure last year was \$4,414,370, and the revenue \$4,176,139.
