Island Born Doctor Honored

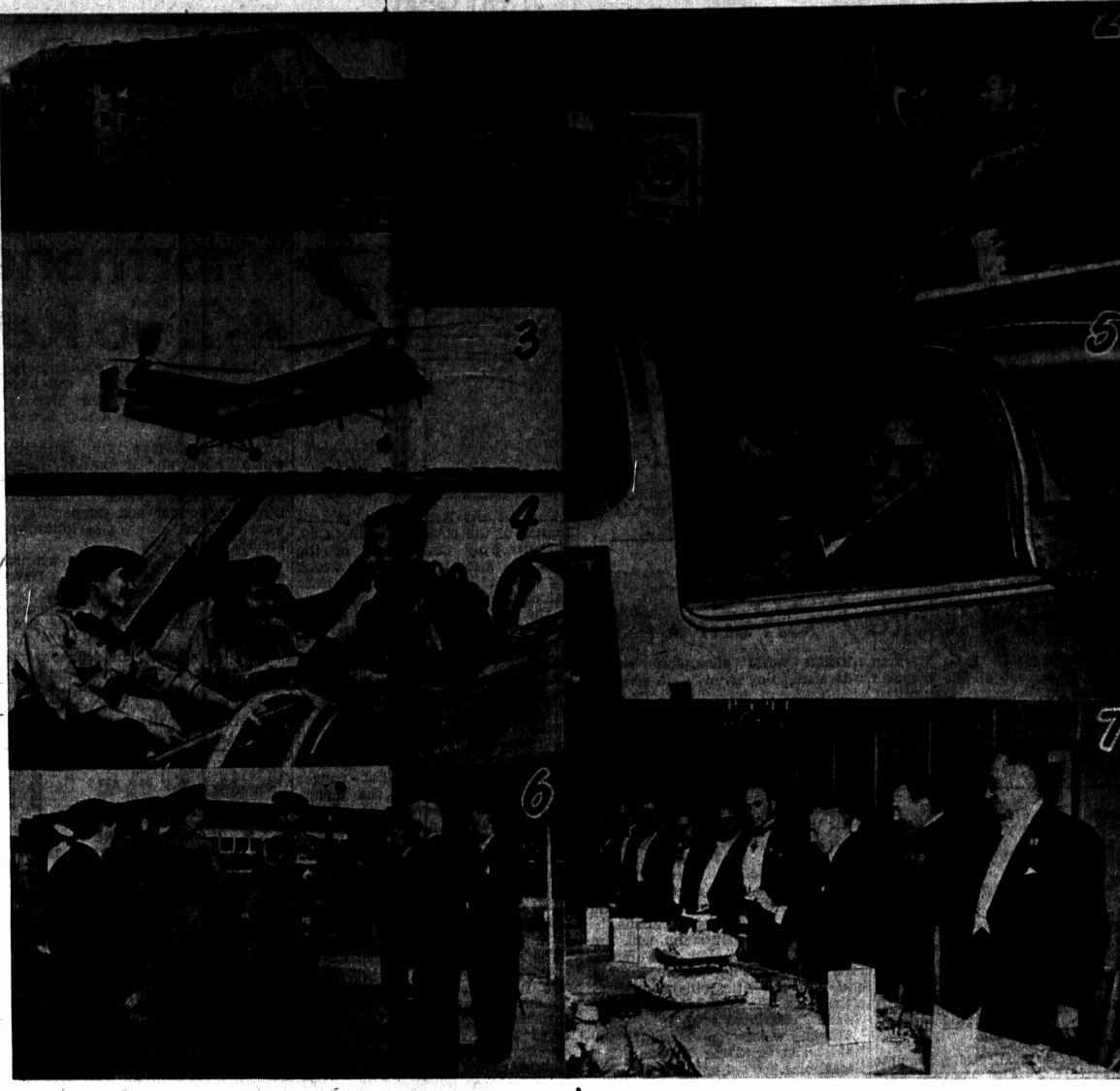
The following newspaper account on Dr. H. F. MacInnis, who formerly lived in Sours, was taken from the Camrose Canadian in Alberta. Dr. H. F. MacInnis of the Smith Clinic is celebrating the completion of his medical colleagues on the occasion of his election to Associate Membership in The American College of Physicians in the American College of Physicians at Philadelphia, Pa., on Nov. 14th, 1954. Membership in the American College of Physicians is limited only to certified specialists in Internal Medicine who meet the requirements and leads to Fellowship in the College. It is the policy of the American College to restrict membership to citizens of North American countries. Dr. MacInnis is the only Alberta doctor so honored this year. Doctor MacInnis referred to above graduated from Queen's University in 1941 leading his class. He served for three years in the R.C. N.V.R. as medical officer on the H.M.C.S. "Ottawa". He took a post graduate course in internal medicine at the Deaconess Hospital in Great Falls, Montana, U.S.A. and in 1953 received an honorary degree from the University of Alberta. For the past number of years he has been associated with the Smith Clinic at Camrose Alberta. Doctor MacInnis received his early education at Sours, Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and St. Dunstan's University. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian MacInnis of Sours.

Astronomers Find Seeds Of Possible Stars Of Future

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Astronomers probing into the darkest spots in the sky possibly have come across the "seeds" from which as yet unborn stars will develop, American scientists were told Monday. These vast black masses are made up of countless tiny frozen particles of matter. They are embedded in enormous clouds of cold hydrogen, and hydrogen is the main substance of which all things in creation are made. The nature of these seeds was determined by astronomers at Harvard university and reported by one of them, Dr. Bart J. Bok, to a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The vast hydrogen clouds previously were found by other investigators. The hydrogen is so cold that it does not glow—250 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit, or colder. Since it does not give off light, it cannot be detected with ordinary telescopes. It was found because it gives off radio waves rather than light waves.

USE RADIO TELESCOPE

Using Harvard's big radio telescope, Dr. Bok and associates measured the intensity of characteristic radio microwaves given off by both the vast hydrogen clouds and the dust masses or seeds inside them. In this way they found that the seeds contain proportionately less hydrogen than the clouds around them. This means, Dr. Bok said, that the seeds may be subject to further development by the condensation of hydrogen around them. The seeds themselves, although much less dense than the earth's atmosphere, may be subject to physical forces which could pack them tighter. Light from distant stars is one of the things which could do this. It exerts a slight push on matter which it strikes. Also a body such as this seed may develop gravitational power of its own and thus attract particles to it. Cloud shapes so far determined indicate they are in the form of thunderheads, with rounded lobes forming their outer edges, Dr. Bok reported. This suggests that the hydrogen masses may be taking the form of spherical masses
