MATRICULATION EXAMINATIONS.—St. John's Sun: The University matriculation examinations closed on Friday afternoon. Twenty-seven students presented themselves, fifteen of whom were young ladies from the Girls' High School. The other twelve were boys from the grammar school. This number is much larger than in any previous year. Bertha E. Clarke, of P. E. Island, was among the students who passed the examination. POLICE COURT.—This morning three young lads named William Mahor, Bernard McKelton and William Potter were sent up for trial in the Supreme Court for entering the store of Archibald Kennedy, Lower Queen Street, last week, and taking therefrom some pocket knives and other articles. The liquor stealing case also came up for further hearing. After taking some evidence, Cummings, Valley and Mahor were sent up for trial in the Supreme Court. McKeen and Wakefield were remanded. One drunk was disposed of for \$2 or 8 days. CALLER BOYS BROKEN.—On Wednesday last, James M. Donald, a son of Mr. John Macdonald, Clermont, had his collar bone broken and wrist badly strained, in a rather peculiar manner. We are informed that he was leading a horse by the mane, in which his hand somehow became entangled. The horse starting to run, with his free hand he made an attempt to catch the animal by the nose, but before he could do so, it sprang sideways, throwing him. He does not know whether the injuries were inflicted by striking a stone, or by being kicked by the horse.—S'aside Agriculturist. A NARROW ESCAPE.—Last night while Mr. Donald Nicholson, tobacconist, was showing some friends over the Northumberland, he fell with an accident that might have been fatal. It appears that Mr. Nicholson, wishing to get into the saloon, inquired of one of the men belonging to the steamer the way to enter it, but mistaking the door, opened one which led to the smoking room below. Not knowing that a flight of stairs led immediately from the door, he fell forward and was precipitated some nine or ten feet to the floor. When he was picked up he was unable and driven home. Several doctors were summoned, and after about half an hour of unsuccessful treatment, he revived. It is pleasing to hear to-day that Mr. Nicholson is much better, and but for the rough shaking up, is otherwise unhurt.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. CANADA'S NEW PREMIER. Hon. Mr. Abbott Chosen. No Material Change Probable. OTTAWA, June 15. Hon. J. J. C. Abbott has undertaken the formation of a new Cabinet after having a full understanding with those of his colleagues who had been spoken of in connection with the Premiership, and after receiving assurances from them of their cordial support. Sir Hector Langevin and Sir John Thompson were both called upon by the Governor General, but both declined. The new cabinet will not differ materially from the old. No reconstruction is probable till after the session. Having accepted the premiership, Hon. Mr. Abbott's first act was to resign from the directorate of the C. P. R., and to order the sale of all his shares in that railway.

IRISH AFFAIRS

A NEW MOVE. NEW YORK, June 5. A Dublin despatch says that the Telegraph confirms the news that the Irish bishops, finding the cost of maintenance of the Irish members in parliament a heavy parochial drain, are working to secure the return to the House of Commons at the next general election of wealthy candidates who will form the nucleus of the new Irish party. The Telegraph says that the selection of these candidates has already commenced. For various reasons the bishops will not support the election of several McCarty members.

Terrible Railway Accident.

LONDON, June 15. Advice of yesterday are to the effect that a terrible railway accident has occurred at Switzerland. While an excursion train was passing over a bridge, the structure collapsed and the train fell through. Sixty persons were killed outright, and upwards of one hundred were injured.

A Cargo on Fire.

NEW YORK, June 15. The cotton cargo of the Inman Line steamer, City of Richmond, took fire on the voyage from New York to Queenstown, and great alarm prevailed for several days. There were one hundred and thirty barrels of oil stored close to the burning cotton. Luckily, however the fire was subdued before the oil caught.

The Crimes Act Removed.

DUBLIN, June 15. The Gazette contains a proclamation removing the Crimes Act from operation. The proclamation is signed by Secretary Balfour.

AN ISLANDER DROWNED.—An inquest was held at Bayfield, Antigonish County, N. S., upon the body of a seaman supposed to be that of William McKay, of Murray Harbor, one of the crew of the schooner M. E. Lloyd, cast ashore at Monk's Head in November last. The body was found on the shore on Wednesday. A verdict of "found drowned" was returned. The body was interred in the cemetery at Bayfield.
