FARM POULTRY HOUSE.

How to Construct—Convenient Nest Boxes—Value of Road Dust.

Our illustration, which is redrawn from Practical Farmer, represents a poultry house for the farm. It is 30 feet long, 35 feet wide and 15 feet high. A passageway 5 feet wide extends the full length of the house, and the right side. This leaves a space 20 feet wide.

THE ENTIRE LENGTH which is divided into 10 feet wide, making ample room for 35 hens. Each pen is provided with nest, comfortable, dark nesting place, about 14 inches square, shown at N in the illustration. It is seen to prefer dark nests. The roosts are movable poles and are not placed near the entrance to the runs to avoid exposure to cold air. These entrances are provided with sliding doors WHICH CAN BE SECURELY FASTENED at night to shut out the cold as well as cats, rats, etc. The dust box, D. B. is made by nailing a plain board a foot wide across the crupper from the boxes to the side of the house. Keep these boxes half full of dry, clean road dust, to which the hens can always have access. Dust is a very useful and essential article about the kept house, as the openings into the yards are shown at E. R represents the roosts and D doors. At the rear of the hall-way is a food box, T. B. to keep things neat, to clean up droppings, grind bones, chop meat and anything necessary about the building. The bins, F. H. for feed, are also handy, being by the pens and accessible at any time.

CONCENTRATED WORK.

Low—The Cost of Production—Do Not Have Any Waste Land.

We often hear it stated that overproduction is the cause of all times. An abundant yield of all kinds of crops can be harmful. Abundance of food and clothing can not produce suffering. Plenty tends to lift. But the difficulty is that the cost of production often exceeds the value of a crop. Excessive acreage per man and minimum yield per acre is the lane of the farmer. The profits from the products of the farm can only be increased by diminishing the cost of production. It would be better if every farmer having 100 acres of land with some land to spare, would sell a mortgage on the same, would sell \$0 acre and pay off the mortgage and put the remaining \$0 acres and the money that would have gone to pay interest and taxes on the \$0, into improvements on the land which is left. Put the SAME WORK AND CARE

on the \$0 acres which the 100 received. Hence the stable returns was allowed to wash out into the ravines or pile up in the yards and become a nuisance, take care of it and haul it out on the land. Carefully plow and cut every weed and thoroughly cultivate all crops at just the right time. Make one acre produce as much as two did before and have the same amount of match and other things, thus reducing the cost of production and enhancing the worth by the better quality. On some farms drainage is an important item. The water can be run into a ditch to put in the drains can better use his surplus funds in this way than in trying to buy all the land adjacent to him and then being left with a few acres owned by one man who is VIRTUALLY "LAND FOR."

He has as good soil as any in the world, but it is formed year after year by transitory tenants and has been poisoned and weeded and damaged by poor tillage until it produces annually about an average of 25 bushels of grain per acre and 40 bushels of clover, alfalfa and other weeds too numerous to mention. There are thousands upon thousands of acres of unweeded land in fence corners, brush thickets, stony points and wet spots within the limits of farms owned by men who are willing to be able to buy some more land, and this same unweeded land contains the purchase price and many instances interest on it and taxes too; and if only developed by a little labor would be worth the most fertile land on the farm. In more thickly settled portions of the world every spot and corner is utilized as is also every possible means to promote fertility, thus increasing the production and diminishing the cost.—Orange Judd Farmer.

Hints About Ditches.

It is a bad blunder to make ditches of a shape that will fall in by the percolation of water or heaving of frost. Instead of making the sides perpendicular or nearly so, let them slope from a top 4 feet or more wide, to 18 inches at the bottom, as in Fig. A. At Fig. B is shown a still more desirable ditch, in which the sides are graded so that the water will flow in it cannot get out of order. The mower and rake also are not hindered in their working, but perform well, going into and out of the ditch as when on a level. B is especially suited to meadows very wet in spring and fall and dry at harvest time.—Holster Sage.
