tion, economics and finance — all is done now on an international scale.

The press is everywhere and with it the film, radio and television are the brain and nerve forces which, for the first time in history, have made the pulses of our planet beat the same rhythm at the same moment of time.

The contradiction of man's increasing technological unity with isolation at the personal level is the great social and psychological problem of our time. For that it increases interdependence industrialism tends to destroy the old natural community which grew up from the cooperation of families.

Why does the industrial worker often show so little interest in his job? Why is sex the dominant topic of talk while at work? Because the worker's life has been largely emptied of human content. One of the chief evils of our industrial capitalist system is not exploitation of the worker, but the destruction of the culture patterns which gave man the dignity and status in the community. Today money has become the primary fruit of the toil that wears away at the worker's life, instead of dignity and status among his fellows.

Abstemious, high labor turnover and poor quality of work are some of the effects. Unions have done much for the worker, but have they really tackled the problem of integrating work with

THE IMAGE OF GOD Man's Final Creative Act

In the second of two lessons on the first two chapters of the Bible, we shall concentrate on the creation of man, the final act of God's creative work, and this fact in itself gives man a dominant place in the universe.

Furthermore, there is more space assigned to the account of this creation in Genesis than to any other single product of God's creation. Man is the only creation made in God's image, the only one into which God breathes His Own breath, God also specifically gives man dominion over the earth.

This image of God is sometimes misinterpreted to mean that man is made in form like God's. We must remember that God is Spirit, without form; the image is one of personality or essence of being. The image was marred in man's fall, and restored through Christ. Because of our likeness to God, we have the possibility of communion and understanding with Him.

God's command to man was twofold: he was to multiply and to have dominion over his world. The word "replenish" does not mean to fill, but that a race had existed previously, but that man was to fill the earth.

In the two chapters assigned here, we find two accounts of
