**Decide On Site For New School At Montague**

A motion that the Community Welfare League sell sufficient land at the north end of the League Grounds on which to erect a new school; the site and dimensions of which to be subject to the approval of the trustees and the School Board, was passed by a vote of 7-5 at a special meeting held at the High School last evening. The motion was moved by George Nicholson and seconded by T. M. Llewellyn. Mr. A. D. MacLure, president, presided over the meeting.

A previous motion moved by L. MacKinnon and seconded by W. D. Johnston, that the League be empowered to sell sufficient land for a new school adjacent to the present school was defeated 7-3.

The site of the new school will be some 200 to 300 yards north of the present building, it was reported.

The meeting called for the purpose respecting the disposal of land for the new school, digressed to a discussion of the proposed school itself. It was contended that the four-room unit was insufficiently large, and in time more rooms would be required. It was stated, however, that the present plans which are being considered, would lend themselves to an indefinite expansion.

**Address and Presentation Murray Harbor North and Vicinity**

Rev. H. R. and Mrs. Bell of East Point, P. E. I. were honoured by members of the congregation of the Baptist and Christian Baptist Churches following evening service on June 8th, when an address was read to them and presentation made on the occasion of Rev. Mr. Bell's retirement.

The address was as follows:  
Dear Mr. and Mrs. Bell:  
This evening, we, as members and adherents of this congregation which you have ministered to so faithfully for so many years feel very keenly when we realize the fact that tonight's service terminates your present pastorate with us for the past eleven years. And this is not all, you labored with us from 1929 to 1937 and as far back as 1912 to 1913, covering a period of almost twenty-one years which is a long time for any minister to shepherd the same flock. Many ministers have in their day ministered to their congregation for more years, this record has been broken even in this church, but the fact that you have been called to the pulpit of these two churches for the third time is a record in itself which we doubt has ever before been attained by any minister.

Your services have been inspiring and unexcelled, fearlessly prepared and delivered as God gave you forethought and utterance. You were swayed neither to the right nor to the left by either the wrath or the praise of men. You preached Christ as you found it in Holy Writ and tonight while we regret your relinquishing your charge with us we feel happy in the knowledge that you and Mr. Bell are not going far removed but are settling in our midst and will be, as you have been in the past, "one of ourselves," and that the best interests of this congregation for the cause of Christ will be ever under your scrutiny.

Your long lives of service for Christ is indeed a great experience as well as a great service and we pray that you both may have many more years of Christian service and fellowship in the Master's service. We know also that you will be a tower of strength to the young man who is coming in our midst and through your long life and experience in the Christian ministry and more especially in this field, your advice and help will oftentimes be sought, not only by our pastor but by his successors, and by the officers and members of these two churches.

In your sojourn at East Point you have witnessed many changes. Most members and officers who composed your congregation of forty years ago are today sleeping their last quiet sleep beneath the green on yonder hills. You have ministered to them in sickness, you have stood by their bedsides, you have led their funeral corteges, you have eulogized, and administered the last sad rites which the living can administer to the dead, you have comforted those who sorrowed. Those who were little children of that day are the older men and women of today. The majority of the present congregation were then unborn and have since been led by you to the knowledge of Christ and into baptismal waters and fellowship of the local churches and are today serving in their Master's vineyard in various capacities. Aside from the spiritual life and numerical strength of the church it has had a complete face-lifting. The churches, manse, and all other church property are in a better state of paint and repair than they have been at any time in their history.

The inauguration of the Mother's Day offering by you in 1935 has put the church on a financial basis in which it never before enjoyed in its history and stands as a gigantic monument to our mothers living or dead. In fact, this church was founded by the efforts of two stalwart Christian mothers of this district.

So tonight, on behalf of this congregation on the close of your pastorate here and in token of your many years of Christian service with us, we ask you to accept with us, not because of their value, but as a memorial of the good-will termination of pastorate and wife and people of those districts.
